Housewives, motorists and business concerns may do well to exercise safety precautions in regard to their property, for thieves who went on the rampage on Thursday evening showed a wide diversity of criminal interest.

Attorney General And Deputy Return From U.K.

Returning from the United Kingdom where they represented Prince Edward Island before the Imperial Privy Council in an appeal from a ruling handed down by the Supreme Court of Canada, dealing with the right to control long haul truck and bus traffic in Canada.

The appeal was brought from a judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada in October 1951. The appellants Provincians were supported by the Canadian Automobile Transporters' Association, a national truckers' group, represented by two of its member firms.

On the other side was the Attorney General of Canada, appearing for the Federal Government, as well as counsel for the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways, who also represent the MacKenzie Coach Lines, one of the original litigants.

The case resulted from the granting of a license in 1949 to MacKenzie Coach Lines permitting it to operate buses from Boston through the Province of New Brunswick to Halifax and Glace Bay, N. S.—S.
