THANKSGIVING DAY was generally observed in this city. The usual services were held in the churches, and the public offices, as well as many of the principal stores, were closed. The weather throughout the day and evening was wet and disagreeable and few people were abroad.
The bazaar in aid of the Second Methodist Church, held in the Market Hall yesterday afternoon and evening was, notwithstanding the disagreeable weather, well attended and passed off successfully. The fancy, tea and refreshment tables were well patronized. The proceeds are in the neighborhood of \$150.
MR. D. EDGAR HUNTER, formerly of Alberton, but now a resident of Salem, Mass., gave an exhibition of bicycle riding at the Roller Rink last evening. Owing to the disagreeable weather and the attractions elsewhere, the attendance of spectators was not so large as usual; but those who were present evidently appreciated the performance.
THREE young ladies, natives of the Island, will make their profession at the Mother House of the Congregation de Notre Dame, Villa Maria, Montreal, on the 23rd inst. Of this number two, Miss Clarke and Miss Frazer, are from Vernon River Parish, and the third, Miss Green, is a Charlottetownian. Miss Clarke will be known in religion as Sister Mary Georgina, Miss Frazer as Sister Mary Genevieve, and Miss Green as Sister Mary Gertrude.
A JUDGE AS A CHAPERON.—Sir John Holker one day was leaving the House of Commons when he was addressed by two strange ladies, who asked him to show them the House. He politely led the way, duly pointing out the objects of interest. At the end of the ladies handed to their conductor a sixpence, which the Queen's Attorney-General took with a low bow and afterwards hung upon his watch chain, declaring that it was the only sixpence which he could safely say he had honestly earned.—From "A Generation of Judges."
The examination of the captain and mate of the bark Ivy, who are charged with murdering a sailor named Pierce, was commenced in Halifax on Wednesday. The evidence so far taken goes to show that the sailor was kept in irons for seventy-five days; that he received little or nothing to eat while so confined, and was beaten about the head and body with a belying pin and a loaded whip; that the ship's officers were drunk almost continually; and that, as a result of this inhuman treatment, the sailor died. The counsel for the defendants, Mr. Drysdale, asked the Stipendiary to issue an order that the reporters be not allowed to publish the evidence; but the request was not granted.
The Amherst correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle writes under date of Monday: "The very sad death occurred here yesterday of Mr. Charles E. Perkins, of Charlottetown, after an illness of only a few days, caused by blood poisoning. Mr. Perkins came here about six months ago to work in Messrs. Fitter & Page's dry goods establishment, and made a great many friends, especially among his fellow clerks in the town. His body was taken by this morning's train to Point du Chene, to be sent by to-day's boat to Charlottetown for interment. The clerks all followed the remains to the depot. Rev. Dr. Lathern and Mr. A. B. Ester accompanied his young widow to the Point. Much sympathy is felt for her in her sudden bereavement. Mr. and Mrs. Perkins had been married less than a year." The remains of Mr. Perkins arrived here on Wednesday evening, and were interred in Sherwood Cemetery yesterday forenoon.

The basis of union was read at the morning session and disensed with closed doors at the afternoon and evening sessions. There is little doubt that with few amendments the basis will be adopted after which it will be submitted to the conference and convention for their approval.

The exhibit, which consists of samples of bright and dark smoking and chewing, was handsomely put up and was the recipient of much favorable comment previous to its being sent to the Exhibition. THE market to-day was poorly attended and sales were somewhat slow at the following prices:—Beef (small) 7 to 10 cents per lb.; do per qtr 4 to 7 cts; mutton, 5 to 8 cts; pork (small) 6 to 8 cts; lamb, 35 to 60 cts per qtr; ham per lb, 13 to 14c; fowls, 35 to 40 cts. pair; butter (fresh) 20 to 22c; do (tub) 18 to 20c; eggs, 20 to 22c; flour per 100 pounds, \$2.25 to \$2.75; oatmeal, do, \$2.30 to \$2.50; oats, 32 to 34 cts; hay per 100, 65 to 75c; potatoes, 15 to 18c; straw, per load \$2 to \$2.25; codfish, 25 to 65 cents; pork, per carcass, 4 cts; pigs \$2.50 to \$3.00 per pair; apples, 50 to 60 cts. per bushel; geese from 50 to 60 cts; ducks from 50 to 55 cts; turkeys, 11 to 12c; turkeys, from 70c to \$1.50; fresh herring 10 cts per doz.
SAYS the Summerside Journal: "A girl named McCarthy, who was a familiar figure on our streets, has not been seen so frequently for the last few months. It seems that she has been living in a hut in the woods near Summerside. During this time there have been frequent raids on cellars in various parts of the town, the thefts being confined to bread, butter, etc. On Friday night last, policeman Kelly met her coming out of E.
