MORE SHEEP.—The Sun says: Three car loads of sheep passed through St. John on Wednesday, from P. E. Island for the American market.

THE DREDGE.—The Prince Edward, Dominion Dredge, has been laid up for the winter at Casumpee. This is the usual time for suspending operations.

A BID LIST.—The Record says that all told there were eighteen persons in the Amherst jail on Tuesday night. One of the prisoners was a woman.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Bonavista arrived here from Montreal at three o'clock this morning. She will sail for St. John's direct, this evening, taking a cargo of produce, etc., and about 175 sheep on deck.

LAST TRIP.—We understand that the steamer Worcester will not make another trip to Charlottetown this season. The steamer Miramichi, as advertised, will make her last trip to Charlottetown this evening.

SPECIAL TRAIN.—The special train to Summerside yesterday was in charge of Conductor Macgowan, with Mr. Armour as engineer. The run from Summerside to Charlottetown last evening was made in the quick time of one hour and fifty minutes.

WILD GESE.—This class of sea fowl is reported remarkably plentiful this season. Millions of wild geese cover the whole face of the bay to-day, writes a Casumpee correspondent of the 30th inst. The heavy weather has prevented their feeding to any extent, and they are, therefore, poor picking so far.

AT CANSO.—The Hattie Louise, from Demerara with a cargo of sugar and molasses for Carvell Bros. arrived at Canso yesterday. She will go on the slip at Port Hawkesbury, and is due in Charlottetown about Wednesday next. Captain Barnard left to join her yesterday afternoon.

PROHIBITION.—The annual convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union opened at Kingston, Ont., on the 29th. Mrs. Fawcett, of Toronto, the president, reported that the prohibition sentiment was growing and that legislation in that direction would be sought at the next meeting of parliament.

MISSING SCHOONER.—The Journal reports that the schooner Spy, Brennan master, which sailed from Alberton over ten days ago, is missing. A heavy gale sprung up just as she left port. She was loaded with oats for the New Brunswick market, and had a crew of three—the Captain and two boys. Great anxiety is manifested by the friends of those on board.

SOLD.—The Summerside Journal says: The sale of the hull, rigging and cargo of the wrecked ship Cleopatra, of Buenos Ayres, took place at Hardy's Harbor, Lot 12, on Monday last. Mr. A. Callaghan was broker, Mr. John Gaffney, of this town, was present as Consul for the Argentine Republic, and Hon. L. C. Owen was on the spot in the interest, we understand, of the underwriters. The cargo of deal, which brought \$800, was purchased by Hon. John Yeo, and Mr. E. Lantalam, of St. John. Mr. Lantalam also bought the hull (of which scarcely anything was to be seen) and the anchors for \$6, and Mr. D. Milligan bought the deck and houses for \$16. The rigging was sold in lots, between forty and fifty in number, and was purchased principally by farmers and others living near. There was a large attendance at the sale.

A FEW DAYS AGO an American, travelling in the interest of Ferry, Seedman, was overheard to say that he could seldom or ever find celery on the country table, and he wondered that the Island people did not use more of this kind of vegetables. He was, at the same time, observing his landlady for not providing some for dinner. The American appetite for celery is on the increase. It has become a necessity, not a luxury, with them, and they will have it at any cost, 25 cents not being an unusual price for one stalk. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Big Gale—Drowning Accident.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 30. It is generally acknowledged that not since the Saxby gale has such a wind storm prevailed, as for a portion of to-day's. When the storm was at its height shortly after noon a particularly sad drowning accident occurred. With some companions Fred. Munde, aged 13, son of F. Munde, liquor dealer, was on the wharf fronting on Courtenay Bay. He picked up a board, and was in the act of throwing it into the water when the wind caught it, carrying Munde into the water. An alarm was soon given, and Fred Young, aged 19, son of Robert Young, formerly a dry goods merchant in Charlottetown, who worked in Howe's factory, secured a life buoy, attached about fifty yards of rope to it, and giving the end of rope in charge of boys, leaped into sea, which was at the time dashing up ten to fifteen feet high, to rescue Munde. Young swam out to the youngster, but to allow him to do so, the rope being short, had to be attached to a pole. Just as Young reached Munde, the rope slipped off the pole and the two commenced to drift about. Young supported by the buoy firmly holding Munde in his arms. Two men got a boat, and in launching it was swamped by a mountainous sea while a second one launched a few minutes afterwards was smashed to pieces. Word was sent to Reid's Point for a lifeboat and with promptness it was launched and manned, but when about half way to the scene, Young, who had fought for life in the water for an hour had disappeared. The bodies of the two young fellows were recovered this evening.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 30. The government to day wired its acceptance of the St. John City Council's offer to buy the Carleton branch railway for \$40,000.

Hon. Mr. Foster has been for some time in communication with Mr. Furness, with a view to securing more frequent communication to meet increased trade, and has now succeeded in inducing the Furness Line to put on five new steel steamers, fitted with modern equipments and lighted by electricity, in addition to the two steamers now running. This will give a sailing every sixteen days, and will be especially appreciated now that new branches of trade with England are being developed. The new service commences next month.

On enquiry from the customs officials as to the duty in reference to Louisiana lottery tickets and lottery tickets coming into Canada, the Department have instructed that such matters cannot be seized, but that the consignees may be prosecuted. The Governor-General is expected tonight.

The Corner Stone Laid.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30. This afternoon Lord Stanley of Preston laid the corner stone of the new building for technical and engineering purposes in connection with McGill University. There was a great number present and the Governor General and Sir Donald Smith extolled the state of higher education in the Maritime Provinces.

MELBOURNE, Oct. 30. The Victorian Ministry have been defeated in the colonial parliament by a vote of want of confidence.

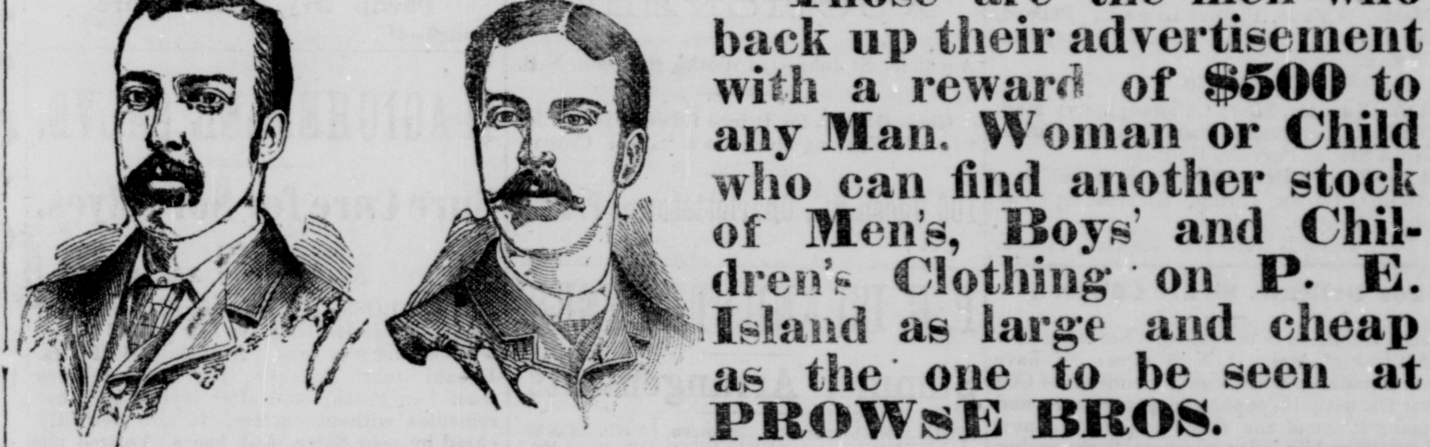
