Church Music Found Difficult

OTTAWA (CP)—A priest-composer at the University of Ottawa says Roman Catholics should strive for the "admirable and imitable" results Protestants have achieved in getting their congregations to sing.

Rev. James Martel, who teaches music in the university's faculty of theology, says Catholic congregations are reluctant to sing because church music is too difficult for them.

He calls on composers to write simpler melodies so that congregations may sing at divine service as the early Christians did.

A 58-year-old native of Acton Vale, Que., Father Martel has studied at the Pontifical Institute of Sacred Music and the Gregorian Institute, both in Rome, and at the Cesar Franck School of Music in Paris.

In 1959 a record was released in France when he sings French-Canadian folksongs under the name Andre Telman, an anagram formed from the letters of his name.

In a new book published in French by University of Ottawa Press, *La Musique Sacree dans nos Paroisses* (Sacred Music in Our Parishes), Father Martel offers a three-step program:

—An international competition to encourage composers to write simpler church music.

—Publication of a hymn book with new tunes and masses.

—Action at the parish level to teach the new music to the congregation.

Father Martel recommends the program specifically for Quebec but says it will work only if the bishops adopt it for the entire province.

Early church music was simple and sung by the entire congregation, he says. But from the eighth century on, Gregorian chant became embellished and complicated and beyond the capabilities of the average churchgoer. For centuries Catholic composers had a concentrated on writing difficult masterpieces "that required specialized interpretation."

BROTHERS RECONCILED

Joseph Prepared For Famine

In this new quarter we begin a study of the story of Israel which takes us from the last years of Jacob and into the beginning of Saul's reign.

Jacob, grandson of Abraham, was the father of the 12 men who founded the Twelve Tribes of Israel (first listed in Genesis 32:26). The story of how Joseph, one of Jacob's sons, was sold into slavery by his brothers; and subsequently became prime minister of Egypt; is vividly told in Genesis 37-41. As prime minister, Joseph ordered the storage of surplus crops during the seven years of famine which struck the Middle East, Egypt, alone, had an abundance of food.

Hearing this, Jacob twice sent his remaining sons to Egypt to buy food. In doing so, the brothers became reconciled with Joseph, who invited them to come to Egypt to live.

Learning Joseph was still alive, Jacob took his entire family—some 66 persons—to Egypt. There they settled in the land of Goshen, an exceedingly fertile area east of the Bubastic branch of the Nile, where they could live a life apart from Egyptian influences. There, Joseph and Jacob were reunited.

Planning the introduction of his father and brothers to the pharaoh, Joseph insisted that they be accompanied by their wives and their children. Shepherding was a despised occupation in Egypt, and by telling the truth, the geographical separation of Israelites and Egyptians would be almost compulsory. As expected, in the ensuing interview, Pharaoh gives Goshen to the Israelites to live in (Genesis 47:6).

Now follows a passage which reveals Joseph's care for his father, a virtue vanishing from today's society. Young people do not want to remember that in a long years of helpless childhood when they were a burden and a curse to their parents, they are unmindful of the tender kindness that nursed them through illnesses; that bore with their petulance; that freely sacrificed sleep and rest, sitting far into the night, contriving dresses, playthings and other surprises.

Were our Lord viewing this situation and knowledgeable of Joseph's concern for his aged parent's comfort, surely He would admonish us to "Go thou and do likewise" (Luke 10:37).

The material from Genesis assigned to our lesson introduces a period some hundreds of years later when the descendants of Jacob have become a multitude, and marks a drastic change in the fortunes of the Israelites.

"Now there arose up a new king over Egypt, which knew not Joseph's name. And the new king probably did not know of Joseph and the great things he had done for Egypt. If he did, considered those services of earlier times totally unimportant to him.

The children of Israel represented the whole mass of foreigners and slaves transported to the Nile valley during military campaigns and Egyptian sovereigns always felt in imminent danger of a revolt. It is these foreigners, so Pharaoh ordered the Israelites enslaved to build store-cities and other monuments to his glory.

Though the work was hard, overseers often cruel and food deliberately insufficient, the Hebrews, in the manner of oppressed peoples everywhere, continued to multiply, so a city swarming measure was instituted. Pharaoh ordered midwives to kill each male child at birth.

When this, too, failed because the midwives refused to carry out the pharaoh's will, a command to the same effect was issued to the whole people: if the Egyptians themselves were to throw every male Hebrew infant to the Nile.

POOL EPISODE FATAL

TORONTO (CP)—Seven-year-old Anna Trella died in hospital Friday, ending a struggle that started when she was pulled unconscious from a city swimming pool last weekend. Her death came hours after a city health officer said two of four parks officials said they were absent at the time the girl almost drowned, contravening a city law that says only one guard can be absent at any time.
