

strator to the latter, which situations he filled with credit to himself and satisfaction to his Patrons. Being however hourly the companion of Adventurers, whose only prospect was the Army, Navy, or Peninsula War. Unhappily for himself, imbibed a notion for travel; so strong was the predilection, that no present acquisitions or the reversion of an extensive practice in London, could divert him from it. His views in the metropolis of Great Britain, the patronage of the above Gentlemen, with the countenance of some of the most distinguished characters, were not inducements sufficient to detain him in England. In the year 1811, he was appointed Surgeon of H. M. Ship —. This appointment was however given up to accompany a friend repairing to Hafi, in a diplomatic character, in whose suit he proceeded to Port au Prince, to which place he arrived in a time to be a witness of the mode of warfare in vogue in that Island, by remaining three months during a siege of that city, by Christopher 1st. From thence he proceeded in H. M. Ship Brazen, as a passenger to Kingston, Jamaica, carrying with him the most flattering recommendations, which could not have failed, to have insured him a practice sufficient in a few years to have realized a handsome fortune,—but the same thirst for travelling, or novelty that had hastened him from England, now urged him from Kingston in the year 1812. Mr. C. became intimate with Sir Gregor McGregor, General Robertson, secretary to General Boleivar, and Doctor Burke, Revolutionary Patriots of South America, who promised him every thing that savoured of fame and fortune in the new Republics of Columbia, he did not however immediately repair to Spanish America, till he had gratified his passion for novelty in taking a general range through the West India Islands. Having arrived in the Province of Carthagena, he was presented to Manuel Jorriees, President of the State, by his friends, whom a few months before had preceded him. He was by their interest appointed Surgeon of the Military Hospital. This appointment gave him an introduction to the first practice in that city; but as there is no possible advantage without a correspondent inconvenience. This situation honorable and lucrative as it was, subjected him at all times to the orders of Government, and consequently placed him in the most perilous circumstances: he as frequently sent on actual service by a land and; twice he had the charge of Expedition against the neighbouring provinces, which at that time held out in our of Ferdinand 7th of Spain. It was one of those unhappy occasions he became a Prisoner of war, and in such a service as those new Republics then were, it is to conceive the horrors that awaited by this sudden change of fortune; he

indured every misery and hardship for the space of two years, together with the loss of some thousands of specie that he never recovered from a counter revolution in favour of His Christian Majesty. Through great interest he was demanded as a British subject, and thus obtained his liberty. Mr. C. was afterwards retained in H. B. Majesty's service in the year 1816.— A fleet up the Mediterranean, and was at the taking or delivering up of Naples, Genoa, and territories belonging to the King of Sarlinia. In the following year he left the navy and repaired to London, when finding from the great influx of medical men, little encouragement for practice, and his habits ill suited to the every day routine of ordinary business amongst so much competition, he lent his mind once more to the fields of the sun, or to new countries now fast emancipating from the fetters of old Spain, having had an introduction to Capt. John Stewart in the year 1819, from his recommendation he came to this Island on his way to South America. Taken a fancy to the Island, and tired with the busy scenes of life, perhaps damp in that arduous which had so powerfully operated on his juvenile mind; and finding those splendid visions evaporate on every occasion, at his near approach, he had purchased by this time, although at a dear rate, the experience which oft times comes too late. He at the early age of 30, shook hands with the world; obtained of the local Government, a small spot of land, barely sufficient for his support, which he cultivates with his own hands; this together with a small county practice, with the esteem of those who have the pleasure of his acquaintance, is an equivalent in his mind to all the acquisitions the world has to bestow.
