Co-op Association Formed At Souris

More than 125 residents of Souris and nearby villages banded together at a meeting in the Community Centre here on Monday evening to organize and give the "go ahead" signal to a new Co-operative Association.

The meeting, which was presided over by Mr. Howland Mulhally, heard Mr. J. G. Henley, secretary of the Co-operative Union describe the operations of the Society and accepted his suggestions on how to proceed to organize.

Rev. William Simpson admonished the members to adhere closely to the principles of the co-operative associations which meant more to the community than a measure of economic success.

He described the principles under which the business is conducted with one vote for each member and no proxy voting; interest paid on capital at not more than five per cent per annum, unlimited membership, political, religious and social neutrality and business on a cash basis.

The difference between the net cost price and the net distributing price, after paying overhead cost, and setting aside reserves, shall be returned to members as savings return in proportion to their patronage, or used collectively for social purposes, if members so desire, Father Simpson said.

Other Speakers Mr. Jerome O'Brien, manager of the I.C.S. and Mr. Byron Webster, manager of the Morell Co-operative Association, addressed the meeting briefly. A campaign will be opened in a few days with a view to securing funds to procure adequate store quarters for the new organization.

In the open discussion which took place prior to the election of the Board of Directors, the fact that 80% of the consumer dollar was controlled and expended by women, was stressed. Two women were named on the Board which was commented upon as the first time in the history of the organization in this Province.

BUILDING AND REPAIRING ACTIVITIES UNDER WAY AT SOURIS

"The potato chip factory has been completed and most of the machinery has been installed. The full scale production of potato chips is expected to be in the near future. This building was constructed of cement blocks and an all cement floor.

This new industry, the first of this type of factory on the Island expects to operate the year around and will employ two men and approximately 15 girls.

Griffin Fisheries' new filleting plant, which is 180 x 80 feet, has the first storey constructed of cement blocks and has an all cement floor; the second storey is built of frame, and this section of the building is rapidly nearing completion.

Two large diesel engines have been placed and set up ready for use. The completion of the building and the installation of the machinery will in all probability be finished in time for this plant to start operations before the present fishing season ends.

This building besides housing the filleting plant has a spacious cold storage department. The work is carried out under the supervision of Mr. Henry McLaughlin.

Eastern Fisheries have just completed the erection of a building on its wharf here, and the installation of equipment for the manufacturing of artificial ice. The latter became necessary due to the heavy demands of the druggers fishing for the company and the limited supply of natural ice.

Train Accident At Elmira

The front truck of a C.N.R. engine was burrowed in the ground as the engine crashed through the end of the Elmira roundhouse Wednesday morning at 6:30.

Young Mail Heir Died Of Pneumonia

CHICAGO (AP) — Montgomery Ward Thorne, young heir to a mail order fortune, died of acute bronchial pneumonia, a panel of four pathologists reported Thursday.

The report was prepared for a coroner's jury which has been investigating the puzzling death of 20-year-old Thorne. Thorne was found dead June 19 in a \$75-a-month flat in the Bohemian section of the near north side.

Dr. Jerry Kearns, the coroner's pathologist and a member of the panel of experts, made the report on what he and the others had determined about the cause of Thorne's death.

"It is my opinion, based on the anatomical examination, that the cause of death of Montgomery Ward Thorne was the result of extensive bilateral acute bronchial pneumonia," Dr. Kearns said.
