Highway Robbery.

General Telegraphic News.

HEMESTEAD, N. Y. 14—Trouble broke out fresh in Hemestead last evening and a party of colored non-union workmen, seven in number, were attacked by a mob of strikers. Both sides fought desperately and fired their revolvers and claspal with knives at close quarters.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14—Secretary Foster said to-day there is no foundation for the impression apparently prevailing in certain sections of the country that the administration has modified its policy of restricting immigration as a precaution against the introduction of cholera.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 11—The prohibition against the emigration of Hebrews, which was enforced during the cholera epidemic, has now been withdrawn. Numbers of parties of emigrants have started for Hamburg from various parts of the country.

LONDON, Nov. 14—A despatch from Paris says fresh cases of cholera are reported in the north of France. A despatch from Budapest states the disease is spreading in western and southern Hungary.

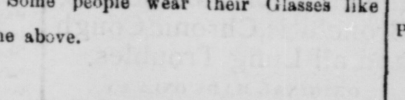

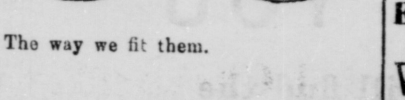
