The general five-per-cent increase, it was indicated in the application, would apply to most types of traffic. A specific exception would be coal and coke, for which a 10-cents-a-ton increase was asked.

The application also made no mention of applying the increase to "competitive" rates, a fact expected to stimulate opposition to the increase from Western and Maritime Provincial Governments which fought the previous rate raises.

Europe, be confronted with facts accomplished (accomplished facts). It was agreed that conversations would take place shortly between German and Allied experts, in which the scale and manner of a German contribution would be examined. The Allied High Commission and the Federal Government, would then discuss these findings.

Expect Lengthy Talks

Allied officials said talks would go on for months. Western generals will discuss the military problem with advisers to be named by Adenauer.

Allied representatives are expected to be Maj.-Gen. George P. Hays (U.S.), Gen. George Ganeval (France) and Maj.-Gen. W. Jones (Britain).

In the running on the German side are Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's former chief of staff in France, Gen. Wilhelm Speidel, and Gen. Adolf Heusinger, who was chief of operations on the German general staff in Russia.

secondary schools and junior colleges be under the jurisdiction of the new type of post-elementary school board; that elementary school units of administration correspond roughly to townships; that all school boards be elected bodies and the practice of appointing some high school boards be discontinued; that the Provincial Department of Education be reorganized.

The report proposed that Roman Catholic separate schools have jurisdiction over elementary education — to age 12 only. It recommended that rights and privileges of separate schools "confirmed in and preserved by" the British North America Act be continued.

On this question the summary added: "The report stresses the paramount importance of the system of public schools — schools free and open to all the children of all the people — and the desirability in the interests of unity to avoid any cleavage in the public school system."

The summary mentioned that four of the 21 members of the Commission submitted a minority report on the separate school question. It did not give details.

probing, the army communique said, was encountered south of Yonchon and eight or nine miles northeast of Sinyu. Yonchon is six miles north of the parallel.

Near Kapyong, 11 miles south of the parallel and 32 miles northeast of Seoul, light contact with the enemy was maintained.

The Red radio at Pyongyang announced on its first broadcast since resuming operations that United Nations forces have been driven south of the 38th parallel all along the line. It also warned that the Red "people's army" will soon launch an attack that will rid all Korea of the "imperialist invaders."

Dec. 17 MacArthur acknowledged that United Nations forces had been forced to pull back behind the Imjin River at Chongrang, south of Yonchon and square on the 36th parallel.

Chongrang, scene of the North Korean breakthrough last June, is 32 air miles north of Seoul. MacArthur's summary Thursday reported signs of heavy traffic, including freight cars, in enemy rear areas, particularly northeast of Yonchon, but did not say whether Chinese or North Korean Reds were involved.

Beachhead Quiet

Hungnam beachhead defences repulsed the Reds' most menacing assault thus far. After the battle the hillside were strewn with frozen bodies of Chinese and North Koreans, garbed in white civilian robes.

Throughout Wednesday Allied land artillery, warships and planes had blasted at enemy forces. The weight of this defensive fire apparently stunned the Reds into temporary inactivity Thursday.

AP correspondent Tom Lambert, on the beachhead, reported there had been no recent battles.

The enemy has been receiving reinforcements around Hungnam. MacArthur's summary said, adding that "air and naval gunfire attacks" have forced the Communists to make extensive use of camouflage. Censors at Tokyo headquarters forbade describing the size of the beachhead remaining at Hungnam.

Imports from the United Kingdom in October jumped to \$41,700,000 compared to \$19,450,000 a year earlier, but total domestic and foreign exports were down to \$48,000,000 from \$72,800,000, the export surplus dropping to \$6,300,000 from \$53,300,000.

In the 10 months imports from the United Kingdom were valued at \$332,000,000, compared to \$260,200,000. Total exports to the United Kingdom dropped to \$393,900,000 from \$501,900,000, and the credit balance fell to \$61,800,000 from \$341,700,000 a year ago.
