

# CHURCHES SAID WILLING TO RENEW NEGOTIATIONS TOWARD UNION

TORONTO (CP)—Canada's two major Protestant denominations, the Church of England and the United Church, said Friday they are willing to renew negotiations toward union.

The executive committee of the Church of England in Canada at the final day of its annual meeting voted in favor of continuing discussions as recommended by the church's committee on reunion of christendom.

Dr. George Dorey, Moderator of the United Church of Canada, commenting on the Church of England move, said the United Church welcomes renewed interest in union. "We are ready to take part in discussion anytime."

The Anglican resolution was introduced by Rt. Rev. William Hallam of London, Ont., a retired bishop and chairman of the committee.

**SCHEME NOT SUPPORTED**

Bishop Hallam said talks between the two churches reached a point of ineffectiveness after it became apparent that a scheme for a mutually acceptable ministry was not receiving support of either body.

He said the church would seek further discussions if the United Church was willing.

A meeting of representatives of the two churches last June had the choice of suspending or terminating discussions, considering the matter at large or attempting to work out a combination of systems of the two churches.

The last was favored, said Bishop Hallam.

**REPORT CRITICIZED**

A report of the committee on Protestant-Roman Catholic relations presented to council for consideration earlier in the day brought sharp criticism by Most Rev. Philip Carrington, Archbishop of Quebec.

The report said personal relations between individuals were established but official relationships "simply are not count-

## Hermann Field Has Dramatic Meeting With Wife

ZURICH, Switzerland (Reuters)—American architect Hermann Field flew back to the free world Friday after five years in a Communist prison and held a dramatic reunion with his British-born wife in a diplomat's waiting car.

Tears of joy streamed down Kate Field's cheeks as she embraced her 44-year-old husband within the privacy of an American consulate car, parked at a side entrance of the airport building here.

They were whisked away to a secret destination—believed to be a Zurich hotel—where Field's sister, Dr. Elsie Field, awaited his arrival. There were indications Friday night that Hermann may have here for the arrival of his brother Noel, a former state department official, and his wife Herta, who were freed early this week from a prison in Communist Hungary.

Communist Poland released Hermann Oct. 24 and announced he had been "framed" by spy charges by former Polish security agent Joseph Swiatoch who fled to the West last December and now lives in Washington.

**VANISHED IN 1949**

Hermann vanished behind the Iron Curtain in August, 1949, while hunting for Noel, who had disappeared the previous May. Hermann had been recuperating in a sanatorium near Warsaw since his release.

All reporters and photographers were cleared from Zurich airport when Hermann flew in from Prague aboard the Swiss airliner, U.S. Consular officials and Swiss police described the touching reunion with his wife who had waited for him through the five years with their two young sons in London.

The officials said Field appeared to have fully recovered from his prison ordeal and was in good health and spirits.

Field has renewed his passport at the U.S. embassy in Warsaw and now is free to move about without restriction.

Field had appealed for as little publicity as possible about his case. It was understood that for this reason, the U.S. embassy requested the ban on newspaper men for his arrival here.

Latest reports about Noel and Herta Field said that he had entered a Budapest hospital for a stomach ailment and she is at his side. They are expected to leave Hungary any day.

**DEFENDED COMMITTEE**

Rt. Rev. F. H. Wilkinson, coadjutor Bishop of Toronto, was quick to the defence of the report and committee.

"The mere fact it is impossible for inter-religious denominations to have a united service on Remembrance Day, the death of a king or coronation of a queen shows we can't get action."

Bishop Wilkinson introduced a resolution which "urges the Government of Canada to provide for a proper and united religious observance of all national occasions such as Remembrance Day in accordance with the religious and democratic traditions of this country."

It was passed without further debate.

## Plead Guilty To Vehicle Theft

—Two young men from Summerside pleaded guilty to theft of a motor vehicle in Summerside court yesterday morning before Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C., and were remanded until this morning for sentence.

The charge arose out of the theft of an R.C.A.F. panel truck which had been parked briefly in front of the C.N.R. station in Summerside on Thursday evening.

Later in the evening the two young men were apprehended by R.C.M.P. who located the badly damaged truck at Churchill where it had gone over a deep embankment.

After leaving Summerside the two had driven to Borden where they disassembled a vehicle and then continued on towards Charlottetown and at Bonshaw were involved in a second collision without stopping.—S.

—Mr. Peter A. Burke, one of the most prominent citizens of Tignish, passed away yesterday afternoon at the age of 73.

Cameron, Summerside; Myrtle, Mrs. Lloyd Foley, New York; Florence, Rev. Sister Mary Leonard of the Order of St. Martha, Charlottetown, and Bernice, Mrs. Donald Davis, Montague. His only son, Leonard, was killed in England while serving with the Air Force during World War II. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Gertrude Brown, Mass., U.S.A.

The remains were transferred last evening from the Gaudet Funeral Home to his late residence from where the funeral will take place at a date to be announced later.

## Rededication Services Held At Kensington

—Rededication services were observed in the extensively renovated Presbyterian Church in Kensington on Sunday the 14th of November.

In the morning service the minister, the Rev. E. H. Bean, led the congregation in a service of personal rededication following which the sacrament of the Lord's supper was observed. The anthem rendered by the choir was "Something For Jesus."

In the evening the Kensington congregation was joined by members of Keir Memorial Church, Malpeque, and Preetown Presbyterian Church, as well as friends from the general area. The Rev. E. H. Bean led the congregation in a service of rededication of the renovated building and the choir rendered the anthem, "God Is Good."

## Strange But True

Nouns of multitude, unless they express persons directly as such, ought not to be represented by the relative who; yet most of us say, "The family, who I visited." The family that I visited seem to be more proper according to most grammarians.

The verb learn is frequently used for teach. Remember the master teaches and the pupil learns.

Different opinions have long existed among critics respecting the passive use of the imperfect participle. Some reputable writers substitute the compound passive participle; as, "the house is being built" — "The book is being printed." The prevailing practice of ed' etc. The prevailing practice of present day authors, is in favor of the simple form; as, "The house is building."

The propriety of these imperfect passive tenses has been doubted by almost all our grammarians; though few of them have penned many pages without condescending to make use of the very thing they condemn. Dr. Beattie says, "One of the greatest defects of the English tongue, with regard to the verb, seems to be the want of an imperfect passive participle." And strange but true, he uses the imperfect participle in a passive sense as often if not oftener than most writers. — Pickbourn's Dissertation on the English Verb.

Indeed there are so many difficult points in our language that few can ever hope to master them all. Even Shakespeare and Sir Winston Churchill are not without their faults in this field. This from the former:

"I never did repent from doing good. Nor shall not now."

Here we have a negation expressed by two negatives when one would have served better. And this from the latter: "The court of Queen Elizabeth, who was but another name" etc. should be, according to well defined grammatical rules, "The Court of Queen Elizabeth, whose name was but another word" etc. And so we have these awkward sentences ad infinitum.

Errors in language are very common in our generation, yet somehow we manage to understand each other and that's what counts in the long run.

Only when we meet up with such sentences as these do we get lost in the jungles of speech. "In a field near 'Slough' I met with the slough of a snake." "The Queen took an airing with her august mother last August."

Then there are those tricky little words like indite and indict, key and quay, principle and principal; check and cheque, counsel and council; fort and forte, draft and draught, practice and practise; dose and doze, all of which cause foreigners who are trying to learn our language no end of trouble, and sends many of our people on the rocks of despair.
