

It is definitely stated that Sir Wm. Harcourt will not be opposed at Derby.

At Blackburn work has been resumed and almost all the operatives have returned to the mills.

A private report states that Earl Granville told the Parliamentary deputation that he would, if a favorable opportunity offered, do his utmost to bring about mediation between the South American belligerents.

An independent communication confirms the report that the Pope has conveyed to Cardinal Jacobini his disapproval of the new religious bill, and has withdrawn the concessions in regard to the clergy in Prussia.

Letters have been received from the mission to Abdul Rahman Khan. The mission was received with every distinction. Three interviews have been held with Abdul Rahman Khan, at which his demeanor has been frank and courteous. His formal reply is awaited.

The Russian military authorities, presided over by Gen. Todleben, are now discussing a plan of campaign to be followed in case of war with China. Todleben in such an event would be commander-in-chief. Very large orders for war material have been given to various contractors.

In the Commons, Monday night, the Government agreed to a motion for an adjournment of the debate on Mr. Gladstone's motion of the 21st inst., to refer to a select committee certain questions arising out of the Bradlaugh case, in order to enable amendments to be made to the instructions to the committee.

Paris newspapers announce that the Government, being convinced that certain foreigners are promoting Socialist agitation in Paris, have resolved to banish all foreigners who have signed protests published in a radical journal against the proceedings of the police on Sunday, together with other foreign Socialists who are most active agitators.

The organ of the German Social Democrats, published at Zurich, contains a declaration of party leaders, excluding Herr Hassellman, the Social Democrat, in consequence of his having expressed regret in the Reichstag that in Germany the Socialists did not identify themselves with Nihilism, which declaration has injured the party interests.

It is asserted that the riots at Barcelona, Spain, were due to the machinations of Intriguers, Federalists and Democrats, whose ends and secret juntas, inspired by Zorilla and Salmeron, are reorganizing a revolution and democracy among the operatives and middle classes of the great town still devoted to Federalistic doctrines. Among the parties arrested are many political agitators and well-known Socialists.

In the Commons Sir Charles Dilke, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, stated that the Government is not in communication with the United States upon the question of the abrogation of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. Gladstone announced that the Government expects within a short time to receive the answers of certain Powers who had been invited to participate in the proposed concerted action with regard to the Berlin treaty. When these are received, Goachen's instructions will be complete and will probably be presented to the House with other Eastern papers. Granville received at the Foreign Office a deputation of members of Parliament on the subject of British mediation between Chili and Peru.

In an article to the memory of the late Senator Brown from the pen of Mr. L. O. David, in the last number of 'Opinion Publique,' occurs the following passage: "Mr. Brown was born to be an Opposition leader. He was fitted for attack rather than for defence. He delighted in active movement. He loved to fight hand to hand and, as it were, with his sleeves rolled up. When he extended his long arms, while his resonant voice rolled through the Parliament building like a trumpet, all heads were turned before the vigour of his onset. A face handsome and noble, a figure tall and imposing, a mind cultivated and full of various information, a character energetic and even violent at times, the enthusiasm of an ancient tribune of the people, vivacity of thought and sentiment, warmth of expression and fervor of delivery, tones firm and vibrating—he had, in fact, every quality that was necessary to act upon the masses and their representatives and to draw them after him. The exigencies of power, the constraint and patience which it demands, were out of harmony with this bold, enterprising and impetuous nature." The accuracy of this description will be acknowledged by hundreds of persons who had good reasons to be acquainted with Mr. Brown's characteristics.

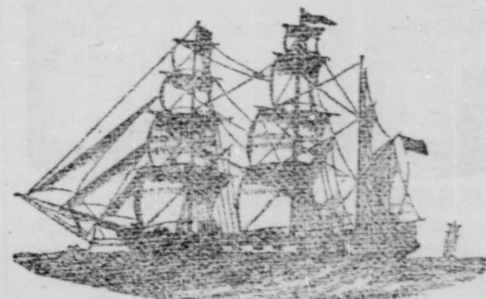
