Intermediate Softball

American Track Clubs Receive Canadian Aid

Dichter, who says the 50-year-old Dyson is the foremost authority on track and field in the world, said in an interview at Guelph that his clinic is modelled on Dyson's. "His methods are exciting and new enough that we are happy to latch on to them."
Dyson was the chief national coach of the Amateur Athletic Association in England from 1947 until he resigned to take the job with the Legion in Canada in 1961. He was a controversial figure, who delighted in stinging on official toes.
