Sad Accident on the Cape Traverse Branch Railway.

COUNTY LINE, Sept. 12. Francis McKenna, a workman on the Cape Traverse Branch Railway was seriously injured this morning owing to the fall of a derrick used for setting stones for the bridge over Dunk River. Dr. Wall was summoned and pronounces the man injured internally and says that the ribs are separated from the backbone. This is the first accident that has occurred so far. The contractors have now one hundred and fifty men employed.

Land League Demonstration.

DUBLIN, Sept. 12. The demonstration at Waterford on Sunday, under the auspices of the Irish National League, was well attended. It is estimated that over 30,000 persons attended. Michael Davitt, in his speech, denounced the Land Act.

Agrarian Rebellion.

AGRAM, Sept. 12. Peasants living between Glen and Petruvia are in full rebellion. The movement is against the land owners. A strong military force has been despatched to the scene of the disturbance.

Lord Coleridge and Governor Butler.

BOSTON, Sept. 12. Lord Coleridge and party were the guests of Governor Butler at Lowell yesterday afternoon, and left Boston for Newport R. I., last night.

Suggestion Adopted.

LONDON, Sept. 12. The Government have adopted Clifford Lloyd's suggestion to form the nucleus of the new Egyptian force from the Irish Constabulary.

The Dynamite Conspiracy.

GLASGOW, Sept. 12. The nine men charged with being connected with attempts made here last January to destroy property with dynamite have been committed for trial.

Lord Rosebury on the Move.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. Lord and Lady Rosebury will arrive here on the steamer Pavonia from Liverpool, which is expected this evening.

Riots in the East.

LONDON, Sept. 12. Riots have occurred on the northern frontier of Croatia, where the peasantry are rising and insulting priests.
