Speeder's Fined After Testimony

Following the hearing of two police witnesses and the accused Raymond Louis Bernard, Charlottetown, was convicted of speeding. Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. fined him \$15 and costs or five days.

Evidence was given by Const. Walter S. Pissent and Donald Bartlett, RCMP Charlottetown.

Gary Lawrence Buell, M. A. 10-b, pleaded not guilty to a charge of attempted theft of \$250 in a 1958 Buick Wildcat, valued 75 cents, and had his case adjourned until Jan. 11.

Hyde Association's Walter Proutie, Charlottetown, charged with driving a motor vehicle without due care and consideration for others using the highway, was adjourned until Feb. 1.

Set over until Jan. 28 at 7:30 p.m. was the case of James Ian Auld, Winsloe, charged with driving while his ability was impaired by alcohol.

The case of Phyllis Ethel Dickson, New Glasgow, charged with the theft of money, was adjourned until Jan. 24.

Pleading guilty to failing to yield the right-of-way at an intersection to the car approaching from the right, Archibald Hartling, Rustico, was fined \$25 and costs or five days.

Failure to stop at a "stop" sign resulted in another accused being fined \$5 and costs or two days.

Famed Canadian Soprano To Sing

A Canadian soprano, Lois Marshall, who has achieved international renown will be heard by P.E.I. music lovers when she appears in the Prince of Wales College, Friday evening, Jan. 9.

Acclaimed in many countries as an artist of extraordinary talent, she has drawn warm praise from critics in many parts of the world.

Her 1961-62 sold-out tour included an itinerary that took her not only the length and breadth of the United States and Canada, but through Europe and once again behind the Iron Curtain, for her fourth tour of Russia, where she has some of her most enthusiastic fans.

After her Soviet Union debut in 1958, when she became the first North American singer even to tour the U.S.S.R. exclusively as a recitalist, she was immediately re-engaged. Her effect on the music-loving Russians was electrifying, and from the opening performance at the Kultura report of her sold-out opening Moscow concert, read in part:

"The sharply contrasting compositions were sung with complete mastery and deep feeling. The richest gifts of Marshall: her ability through vocal means to communicate every shade of feeling and mood. The clarity and lightness of the colorature, the beauty and fullness of sound in the lower register, the moving dramaticism, lyrical warmth and softness, called forth the unanimous enthusiasm of the listeners."

Even Miss Marshall, an extremely modest and reticent young lady who prefers to avoid the public spotlight except when she is actually on a concert stage, wrote to her American manager: "It is quite overwhelming and very moving indeed... it's rather fun to see so famous!"

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Well Known Businessman Charles McKarris, 72, Dies

One of Charlottetown's best known businessmen, Charles McKarris, died Thursday in the Prince Edward Island Hospital in his 73rd year.

Born in Lehanon, as was his wife the former Sadie Kaye, Mr. McKarris came to Canada in 1909 and first established a grocery business in the Nova Scotia town of Berwick.

In 1927 he moved to Charlottetown and opened a similar business in Charlotte town at the corner of Prince and Sydney streets, at which site he operated up until his death.

Mr. McKarris was not only well known among the adult population of the city, but also
