## Experiments With Root Crops

### At the Experimental Farm.

Showing the Value of Different Varieties, and the Importance of Care in the Selection of Seeds.

According to the report of Professor Saunders, seventeen varieties of turnips were sown in rows 2 feet 4 inches apart, and the yields per acre given in the following list have been calculated from the produce of two rows in each case 66 feet long. Estimates based on small plots almost always show a relatively greater yield than when founded on the results of larger areas, but since all the varieties were treated alike and the soil very similar throughout, these figures form a fair basis for the comparison of varieties. They were all sown on the 30th May and pulled the 21st of October. The soil was a sandy loam, rather light in character, which received a coating of from 18 to 20 tons of manure per acre in 1888, and a coating of unleached ashes, about 150 bushels to the acre in 1889:

Twenty-one varieties of mangels were sown in rows 16 inches apart, and cultivated by hand with a Planet Junior cultivator. The land was a good sandy loam and well prepared. Part of it was manured in 1888 and part during the winter of 1890 from 18 to 20 tons of barnyard manure being used to the acre. There were two series of plots. The first was sown on the 2nd of May and pulled 16th October, and the second was sown 14th May and pulled 23rd October. The yield per acre in the first series was calculated from the results from two rows in each case 140 feet long, and in the second from one row 132 feet long. The remarks made under turnips, regarding the estimated yields per acre from small plots, will also apply here.

Ninety-four named varieties of potatoes have been tested side by side on a light sandy loam, which was in oats in 1889, and to which was applied a dressing of from 18 to 20 tons per acre, of fresh manure in the spring of 1890. The drills were ploughed out and the manure put into them, after which it was lightly covered with earth before the potatoes were planted. The planting was done on the 10th May. The size of the plots from which the yield per acre has been calculated varied. The measurements are given in a separate column. As the soil appeared to be very uniform and all the varieties were treated exactly alike, sown at the same time and given nothing more than ordinary field cultivation, the results are fairly comparable:

## Choked by a Python.

TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE OF A SNAKE CHARMER IN A CHICAGO HOTEL.

Prof. Henri Belmont of Paris, France, a snake charmer, stopped at Chicago on his way from San Francisco to New York. He registered at the Grand Palace Hotel, and had sent to his room a blue box about the size of a trunk containing a number of writhing reptiles. During the evening a party of friends visited the professor in his room, and the snakes were taken out of the box and fondled by their owner for the edification of their guests. The party then went to the barroom and had several drinks, which caused the professor to forget that he had left the lid of the box open. Then he went to bed. Fred Newberry, who occupied the next room, was awakened about an hour afterward by a scuffling noise, quickly followed by cries and shouts for help. He ran into the hall and knocked on the door of the room from which the sounds came. "Hurry! He chokes me!" gasped a voice, and Newberry threw his weight against the door, bursting it open. The room was dark, but he could hear gasps and moans of pain. He stepped toward the bed but, with a yell of horror, jumped back again, for his bare foot had come in contact with a wriggling, slimy snake. By this time the alarmed guests were pouring into the hall. The night clerk, William Payne, entered the room and lighted the gas. A horrible sight was presented, and one of the women in the crowd fainted. Lying on the bed, his face black from suffocation, and his eyes bulging from his head, was the snake charmer. Around his limbs and body was tightly coiled the "King of Snakes," a great python. The diamond-shaped head was waving to and fro, and from the mouth shot the long, black, forked tongue. Some cried "Shoot him," "Kill him," and one man ran into the hall and seized the axe. "Untwist his tail," faintly whispered the half-choked professor. It seemed a case of life or death for some one. "I'll grab his head while you untwist his tail," shouted Newberry, and with a spring he caught the serpent by the neck close to the head. It took all the night clerk's strength to untwist the steel coils of the angry reptile. Finally the arms of the professor were freed and he grabbed the neck of the serpent, making at the same time a hissing noise with his lips. With one hand he struck the reptile until he caught it firmly around the centre of the body, and with a deft fling threw it into the box and shut the lid. The work of capturing the smaller snakes was easily accomplished. The python is about 7 feet long. It could easily have strangled its owner.

## Commerce of the Amazon

According to recent news from Brazil, says the New York Sun, there are now sixty steamers plying on the Amazon, nearly all of them belonging to British capitalists; and we learn that this commercial fleet will be greatly enlarged before the end of another year by the British enterprise. Many of these steamers are of heavy tonnage, and are more staunchly built than those that ply on the Mississippi. They carry on business with the towns along the banks of the Amazon, and some of them traverse its main affluents, the Rio Negro and Rio Madeira, while others go so far up toward its navigable headwaters that there is now a probability of its soon becoming a highway for Peruvians bound for Europe. A steamer trip across the continent from the vicinity of the Andes mountains to any place at the embouchure of the Amazon, and a voyage from thence up the Atlantic through the West India Islands to the port of New York, might take up two months of time, but would certainly give the traveler a spectacular panorama that could not be found elsewhere on the globe.
