

# Saint Mary's Outplay Islanders For 6-2 Win At Halifax Saturday

HALIFAX, Jan. 27.—(CP)—Halifax St. Mary's narrowed the distance to second position to three points Saturday with a 6-2 Maritime Major Hockey League win over Charlottetown Islanders.

The win, coupled with Glace Bay Miners victory over Saint John, kept Saints two points ahead of fourth-place Islanders and three points behind Miners.

Halifax shot a single goal in the first period and never looked back. They had a wide margin in play in all three periods and from the goal out played one of their best games of the season.

Islanders, attempting to match strides, found themselves caught out of position many times and the result was a heavy night for goalie Ray Frederick.

The Island cage cop stopped 29 of the 35 drives Saints fired at his net and had the local team's shooting eye been on, he would have been much busier.

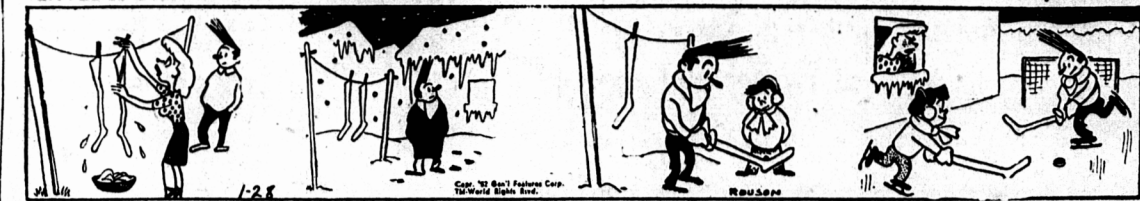

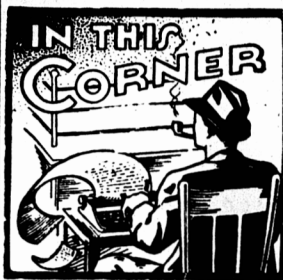
Danny Nixon, high scoring defenceman, rifled in two goals and assisted on a third. Billy Watson set up the plays for three goals

# Islanders Hockey Club Seeks Financial Boost

The executive of the Islanders Hockey Club will ask the people of the Province this week for a financial boost to carry the Island team through to the playoffs, now about six weeks away.

Battling against five mainland clubs since mid-October, the local aggregation has had a stormy season on and off the ice. They have been harshly criticized when they lost, and lauded when they won. They have had crippling injuries. They have been disappointed in their quest for new playing material, have had attendance at their games reduced by bad weather—but with the schedule two thirds completed, they are in second place.

That the Islanders occupy the second spot in the league standing is a mathematical fact that even the most talkative of discontented fans cannot brush aside. Certainly the folks who are backing the four other clubs trailing along in their wake would howl approval if they could exchange places with them at the present time.

Considering that no club in the league is a pushover, and that some of them have made very rough heavy outlays in cash for new players and training expenses than Charlottetown, the league standing at present reflects credit on the local management.

Halifax and St. John carried out pre-season training in Upper Canada after housecleaning their playing ranks, and carefully rounding up entirely new clubs. Glace Bay did not train in Upper Canada but it did pay a long price for Bud Poile as playing coach, and commissioned him to build the team which looks so powerful at this moment.

The local executive has some reason therefore to feel that much has been accomplished in the teeth of the very determined opposition. Halifax people seem to agree because more than six thousand of them turned out to see the Islanders on Saturday night. It was an Island defeat which they hope to redeem here tomorrow (Tuesday) night when Halifax renews the struggle on Forum Ice.

Though they lost to Halifax, the Islanders had a good week beating Sydney and Glace Bay, and earning a draw with St. John. That is winning hockey in most any league.

It can be said then that the club is appealing to the public on its record, and that when that record is looked at without bias, that it is a good one. Better than unthinking critics are willing to concede. It may be that some people will ask whether Big Six hockey is worthwhile. At the least estimate, three to four thousand people who have attended the games from time to time have already answered that question. Their enthusiasm is sufficient proof that they want the Islanders to maintain provincial prestige in the Maritime League.

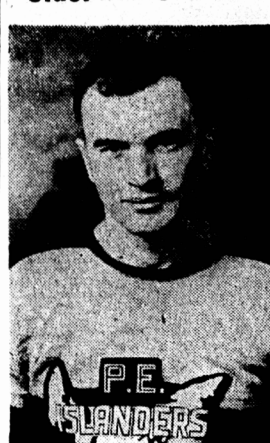
Aside from the thrilling entertainment provided, the advertising value of the Islanders club is something which cannot be too lightly assessed.

Throughout the autumn and winter the name "Islanders" is headlined in every Maritime newspaper many times each week. Other medium of advertising keeps the Province so constantly in the Maritime spotlight.

It costs money but on balance the Province could well regard the money as well spent from the advertising viewpoint alone.

Then it may be well to remember that hockey is the greatest game in the world—and Canada's national pastime.

# Saints Hoopsters Move Into First Place With 95-36 Win Over P.W.C.

Jack Reardon paced the Saints to victory with a 36 point performance, the greatest individual showing during the young season. Reardon fired nine baskets in each half and his scoring alone proved enough to tie the P. W. C.

The Saints raced into a 54-18 lead in the first half on the strength of their best shooting display this year. Young Earl MacKinnon shot four baskets in four tries during the half for eight points. Pete Dunphy and Bob Mooney also scored eight points during the first twenty minutes.

Joey Hoyt was the Welshmen's biggest gun. Hoyt scored nine points in the first half and seven more in the last twenty minutes for a total of 16. Tommy Scantlebury was runner-up for P. W. C. with six points.

Reardon and Joe Mullally led the Saints in the last half. Reardon scored 18 points and Mullally eight. Mullally fired seven baskets during the game for 34 points, second high to Reardon. Earl MacKinnon with twelve points was third for the Saints.

The Welshmen made their best showing in the last quarter when they prevented the Saints from reaching the hundred mark. The Saints outscored their opponents 20-9 on the quarter.

Reardon tossed 42 shots towards the basket clicking on 18 of them for a 43% shooting average. Earl MacKinnon was high in the percentage department making good on six out of eight tries for 75%.
