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United States Track Stars Hold Olympic Spotlight

Helen Stephen Shatters Record As Owens Equals Mark In Metric Century

Dr. Phil Edwards Qualifies In 800 Metre Final. Howie MacPhee Eliminated. German Better Hammer Throw Mark By More Than Five Feet.

BERLIN, Aug. 3.—While young Americans threw blazing speed across the 11th Olympic picture and the Nazi hosts enjoyed another weight-heaving triumph, "old" Phil Edwards of Canada eased his way into the 800-metre finals for the third straight time. Thus the colored Montreal physician set the stage for his last stand at these blue ribbon games.

Dr. Phil's achievement was overshadowed by Jesse Owens's triumph in the 100 metres, the performance of Helen Stephens, also of the United States, in gaining a women's 100 metre final bracket after twice shattering accepted records, and the championship-winner hammer throw of Germany's Karl Hein. The stolid Teuton tossed the weight 185 feet, 4 1/16 inches, adding a fraction less than five feet four inches to the Olympic record.

Edwards Impressive

But Dr. Phil's performance, executed with ease despite the long years of service his nimble legs have seen, was impressive. He was fourth in the 800 at the 1928 games and third in 1932. He wants to retire and he will strive courageously to land a place in tomorrow's final to cap his brilliant career.

The 28-year-old Edwards' success, and that of Windsor's Johnny Loaring in qualifying for semi-finals of the 400 metre hurdles with a second place in his preliminary heat alone brought joy to the Canadian camp as the second day of competition was reeled off before another jam-packed stadium of more than 100,000 persons.

Owens Equals Record

Metcalfe, whose time was 10.5 seconds, was second in the dramatic final as Owens scrambled over the brick red track in 10.3, equaling the world mark Percy Williams of Vancouver set in 1930. The "tan torpedo" led Metcalfe by a yard and a half. Metcalfe was second to Eddie Tolan, another American negro, in the 1932 games.

As Miss Stephens, a lanky Missouri farm-girl, streaked into the century final with races timed at 11.4 seconds and 11.5. Canada's three competitors in the event met the world record surpassed by the United States girl, 11.8 seconds, is held by Stella Walsh of Poland. The veteran Polish star also qualified for the finals, although she finished second to Germany's Marie Dollinger in the second trials.

Aileen Meagher of Halifax and Jeannette Dolson, Toronto youngster, hurried through their preliminary heats while Hilda Cameron, also of Toronto, was running third and out in a trial Emmy Albus of Germany won in 12.4. In the first round, the diminutive Miss Dolson was second, 10 metres behind Miss Stephens. The pretty Nova Scotia girl placed second to Kaethe Kraus of Germany in a trial timed at 12.1.

Halifax Miss Fourth

The burning speed set in the semi-finals was too much for the young Canadians. Miss Dolson was a distant fourth in the test that went to Miss Dollinger. Miss Walsh and the German fraulein were both clocked at 12 seconds but the judges called Miss Dollinger the winner.

Miss Meagher, Canadian favorite, also went up fourth in the smoking wake of Miss Stephens. While Loaring, freshman at the

Miss Jean Jardine of Newcastle, N. B., and Miss G. Keating of Moncton advanced one round, the former defeating Miss Brand of Halifax, 6-3, 6-4, while the Moncton player won from Mrs. C. H. Mitchell of Sydney, N. S., by the same score.

Mrs. H. L. Jones of Halifax started the defence of her title by turning back Mrs. G. Perry of Boston, 6-1, 6-0. Other favorites entered the second round with little difficulty.

Lanky Milton Musgrave of Halifax proved the sensation in the men's section today by eliminating I. Preece, Ottawa stylist, after he had won from A. Horner of Yarmouth by the loss of only three games. The slim Ontario player appeared to tire in the second set and dropped the match, 6-4, 6-0.

J. W. O'Hara of Ottawa, runner-up to Ross Wilson of Toronto last year, advanced into the fourth round by wins over C. Bennycastle of Toronto and C. Harris of Halifax.

E. Murphy, another Ottawa threat in the singles, dropped only two games in eliminating C. Roper of Halifax and lost only one to Jimmy Vooght, North Sydney.

Johnny Piers of Moncton eliminated C. H. Mitchell of Sydney, 6-2, 8-6, and D. Keating of Moncton, 6-5, 4-6, 6-3, to keep up with the first-rankers. Lloyd Keating of Moncton also found little trouble with J. Norris of St. John's, Nfld., and Jack Lloyd of Halifax.

Hopes of bringing the title back to the province rested with Musgrave, Bev Piers, Harry Roper and Don Baud, Halifax players who also advanced into the "sixteens" today by two victories each.

Play in the men's and women's doubles will get underway in earnest tomorrow and the draw for the mixed doubles will be made tonight. The junior tournament will also be started in the morning.

H. S. McNutt of Charlottetown was the only Prince Edward Island racquet welder to survive the second round today. He eliminated C. Retson of Truro, 4-6, 6-2, 6-2, before going down to defeat in turn before the veteran Halifax player A. C. Wiswell, 6-1, 6-4. Don Sanderson of Halifax won from the island's junior champion, M. Measured of Charlottetown, 6-1, 7-5, and Leon Shaw of Wolfville dropped three games in each set to the Charlottetown veteran G. F. Hutcheson.
