THE CAMPAIGN IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

HOT CONTEST.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 3.
 The Provincial political contest is now fairly open. Nominations are being made against the Government will be held in Westmorland and St. John about Wednesday, and in King's County a day or two later. Rumors are in circulation about more defections from Blair's camp. It is said that Mr. MacCreedy, editor of the St. John Telegraph, is ready and anxious to take the field in King's as member of the opposition ticket. Solicitor-General Pugsley withdraws from politics and commends the Government. Mr. Blair has issued his manifesto. He claims to have given the country a careful and honest administration, and takes credit to himself for the abolition of the Legislative Council. He calls his opponents "cowardly slanderers," and alleges that the campaign against him has been made up of cowardly slanders.
