Football.—A match game of football will be played at Victoria Park to-morrow afternoon, between the Crescent Football Club and a team from Prince of Wales College. The game will commence at three o'clock, sharp. As both teams are pretty evenly matched a close contest may be expected.
For Boston.—The steamer Carroll sailed for Boston yesterday afternoon at four o'clock. The passengers were: N. Currie, J. Murphy, D. VanBaskirk and Maggie Trainor. She carried a full cargo made up of 15,665 bush potatoes, 752 cases canned goods, 109 oil barrels and 49 packages sundries.
A Great Success.—There was a large attendance at St. Joseph's Bazaar last evening, and everything passed off very pleasantly indeed. The various tables were well patronized. St. Danstan's Band furnished choice music during the evening, and the fishing pond, etc., gave much amusement. The Bazaar will be continued to-night, to-morrow and to-morrow night.

More Trouble.—Chief of Police Clark, of the St. John force, exploded a bombshell in the ranks of the opposing factions on Wednesday, by reducing Capt. John Weatherhead to the ranks. Weatherhead has been inspector or Captain of police for years, and will now have to patrol the streets under the immediate direction of his mortal enemies, Captain Rawlings and Sergeant Covay. He is a brother of William Weatherhead, whom Chief Clark dismissed from the force a week ago, and who is bringing an action of \$5,000 damages against Clark. The Chief says the change is made in the interests of the whole force. Captain Weatherhead has many friends in St. John, and it is thought that there will likely be trouble over the change.
A Fondness for Corpses.—A St. John despatch says: Coroner Robinson, of Lunenburg, who stopped a jury duty at the circuit on Tuesday, in order to hold an inquest at South Bay after being refused permission by Judge Tuck, was yesterday severely censured by the Judge, and fined the fullest extent of the law and dismissed from the panel. Judge Tuck said Robinson's proceedings were outrageous and that he really wanted to prevent any other coroner from holding the inquest. Coroner Robinson is a very respectable man but is said to have a fondness for corpses. It is related as true that he once rushed into a house where the body of a man who had died suddenly was lying and being but a few feet ahead of another coroner, threw his arms around the dead body, exclaiming, "This is my corpse."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. THE IRISH LAND BILL.

Summary of Balfour's Speech.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
Balfour introduced the Irish Land Bill in the House of Commons to-day. He said the Government's policy was the same as in 1889. For simplicity the bill was cut in half, but both sections were precisely the same as in the bill of 1889. Mr. Parnell had suggested that the privilege of purchase be confined to tenants whose holding was under £50 valuation. Balfour had excluded all purely grazing farmers and farms whose tenants did not reside on them. The limit of 20 years purchase did not appear in the new bill, but further power would be given the vicerey to extend the period to five years, during which 8 per cent. of the purchase money is payable.
Labouchere moved an amendment against pledging the Imperial credit for the purchase of land until the country had given its consent at a general election. This was rejected, 268 to 117. Gladstone, Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt and Morley walked out before the vote was taken. Parnell and all the Parnellite members voted with the Government. The bill was given its first reading.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
Davitt will publish in the Labor World to-morrow an appeal to the Irish race. He implores the people to rise and show themselves equal to the present emergency. If Parnell remains at the head of the party there is no hope of saving the cause of Ireland.

TRADE STATISTICS.

A Good Showing for Canada.

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.
Trade returns for the fiscal year 1890 are complete and will make an excellent showing. The total trade, irrespective of goods entered for transhipment, aggregates \$209,000,000. The imports show a total increase of three millions over the previous year. The imports aggregate \$102,370,000. Of the total imports 70 per cent. were on the dutiable and 30 per cent. on the free list. The duty collected was \$24,000,000. The exports aggregate \$93,750,000, an increase of over seven and a half millions compared with the previous year. Of the exports, 99 per cent. was the produce of Canada.

Military vs Indians.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.
A special to the World from Missoula Montana says a battle is in progress between the Military and Indians near Fort Keogh, Montana. It is said the Indians took the aggressive, refusing to surrender one of their number who shot a trapper. An attempt to secure the offender brought on a conflict which is to all accounts now being waged with great vigor. The Department has ordered the companies of foot Missoula troops to the scene. Advice from various points say lively skirmishing is in progress all along the line.

The Chetwynd Case.

HALIFAX, Nov. 27.
John P. Chetwynd was arraigned before Stipendiary Magistrate this afternoon and examined privately, he remanded till Monday pending the arrival of a witness for the Crown from Boston. The warrant under which the arrest was made charges Chetwynd with forging an invoice dated January 10th, sworn to as correct and purporting to be signed by A. J. Lower, of Boston. The information was laid by customs detectives Bonness and O'Keefe.

Manitoba's Wheat Yield.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 27.
The Department of Agriculture has issued a report on the wheat crop of the Province which was 20 1/2 bushels to the acre, making an aggregate yield of over fourteen million bushels.

Yale defeated Princeton in the football game at Eastern Park to-day, by a score of 32 to 0. About 30,000 spectators witnessed the game.

The General Efficiency Competition.

NO. 2 BATTERY, G. A., HEADS THE LIST OF COMPETITORS—A PROTEST FROM HALIFAX.

It is pleasing indeed to learn that No. 2 Battery, G. A., of this Province, has obtained the highest number of marks in the General Efficiency Competition for 1890. No. 5 Battery, Halifax, stands second. The Commander of the latter Battery, Capt. Oxley, has, we understand, entered a protest against the prize being awarded No. 2 Battery on the ground that Captain Longworth was not present at the inspection, but was afterwards examined, the result of such examination placing his Battery first on the list. This protest will come up for consideration at the meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association, to be held at Montreal on the 3rd December next. The facts of the case are as follows: The inspection of the Prince Edward Island Brigade was brought on unusually early this year, taking place some four days before Captain Longworth returned from Bisley. The conditions of the competition provide that all officers must be present at the inspection. However, Lieutenant Colonel Irwin, the Inspector of Artillery, considering that the carrying out of this regulation would, under the circumstances, be manifestly unfair to No. 2 Battery, decided that inasmuch as the object of the competition was to decide the relative efficiency of the Batteries and that as Captain Longworth had attended the drills of his Battery up to the time of his departure for Bisley and was actually an efficient officer thereof and would have been present with his corps had the inspection been held a week later, it would only be fair to his Battery to allow him the privilege of being examined. With reference to the objection to Captain Longworth's examination, there does not appear to be much in it, and THE EXAMINER is surprised that Capt. Oxley should have raised it. Somewhat similar cases have occurred at various times, when officers were unavoidably absent, but no protests were made. So long as the officers were actually present with their Batteries at the annual drill it was considered that the conditions of the competition were practically observed, and the subsequent examination of the officers was allowed. THE EXAMINER can see no reason for the protest this year, and trusts that a mere verbal technicality will not be allowed to interfere with the main object of the competition. No. 2 Battery is certainly deserving of the highest praise for the splendid showing it has made in competition with Batteries having the full complement of officers present at the inspection.

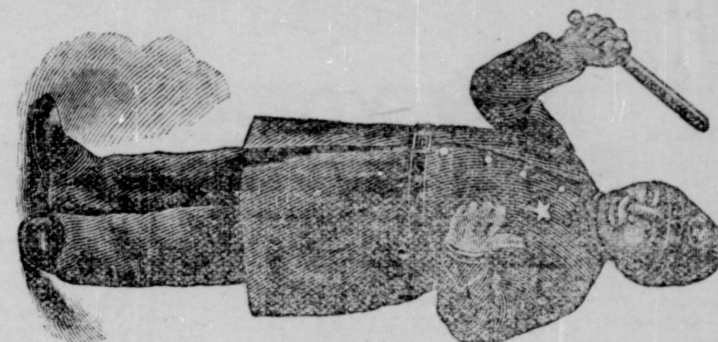

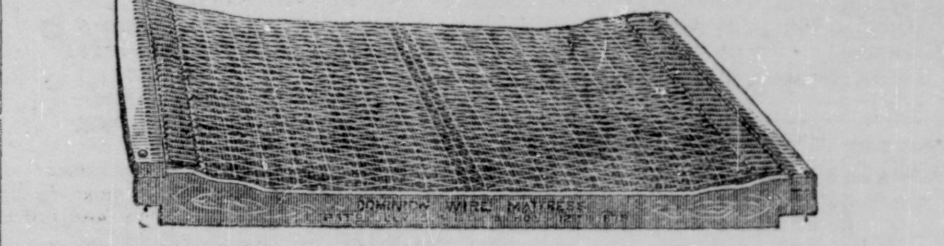
