

Canada Likely To Have Deficit; First Since War

OTTAWA (CP)—Despite a cut in defence spending, lower revenues pushed the government's budgetary accounts into the red by \$84,619,000 in September.

With the government now past the half-way mark in the fiscal year, officials concede there likely will be a large over-all deficit for the full year, the first since the end of the Second World War.

September's revenues dropped by \$28,754,000 to \$295,958,000 from \$324,712,000 a year ago. Finance Minister Harris reported Friday. This cut revenues for the first half of the year to \$1,935,223,000 from \$2,088,617,000.

Yields from personal income taxes increased during September, but those from corporation income taxes declined, along with customs import duties, excise taxes and sales taxes.

SPENDING DROPS

Government spending during the month also dropped, cut by \$27,227,000 to \$380,577,000 from \$407,804,000 last year, mainly because of a reduction in defence expenditure. But spending for the half-year period was down only slightly to \$1,871,802,000 from \$1,888,456,000.

Although September's spending was lower, it still was ahead of revenues, resulting in a \$84,619,000 deficit, slightly larger than the \$83,092,000 adverse balance last year.

This monthly deficit, linked with

those in June and August, cut the available surplus in the treasury to \$65,421,000 for the half-year, just about one-third the surplus of \$200,161,000 in the similar period a year ago.

The government ended the last fiscal year with a surplus of \$46,000,000. Officials estimated that at the current rate, instead of ending with the forecast \$4,000,000 surplus, the administration likely will complete the year with a deficit of perhaps \$80,000,000 or \$100,000,000.

This would be the first year-end deficit in nine years.

PERSONAL REVENUE UP

September's revenues showed an increase in personal income taxes to \$24,748,000 from \$20,049,000 last year, though the six-month total dropped to \$591,177,000 from \$617,029,000.

Corporation income tax yields dropped to \$81,409,000 from \$93,959,000 for the month and to \$497,175,000 from \$588,864,000 for the six months.

Defence spending during September dropped by \$38,029,000 to \$124,960,000 from \$162,989,000, cutting the six-month total to \$686,499,000 from \$774,993,000.

Among the services the major expenditure drop was in the air force, where spending declined to \$50,985,000 from \$74,561,000 for the month. Mutual aid bills also dropped to \$17,737,000 from \$24,839,000.

Fund Raising Campaign Nets \$15,000 For Widow and Four Young Children

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Those occasional rivals, Kitchener and Waterloo, have teamed up to ensure a future for a hero's family.

Civic boundaries have been forgotten in an amazing, neighborhood campaign which up to Oct. 22 netted \$15,000 for Mrs. John Mitchell and her four children. She is the widow of a 37-year-old power shovel operator who died last August as he fought to rescue a city worker from a gas-filled sewer excavation in Waterloo.

Youngsters have held the spotlight. They have sold paper, popcorn and pop bottles, held backyard carnivals and shown home movies to raise money.

EVERYBODY HELPS

Adults have staged dances, passed the hat in plants and offices and made donations as groups. A benefit parachute jump at a nearby auto speedway, one of the more novel efforts, raised \$95. A television marathon netted approxi-

mately \$1,200.

When her husband lost his life, Mrs. Mitchell was faced with the prospect of selling her mortgaged home and seeking other quarters for her children, the oldest only 12.

She sought no aid but her plight was brought to the attention of Kitchener and Waterloo city councils.

TARGET FAR EXCEEDED

A fund was set up with \$8,300, the amount of the mortgage, as the unofficial target. Donations poured in at both city halls.

Waterloo College offered bursaries to the Mitchell children. A bus driver taking a load of veterans to the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto passed the hat en route and raised \$6.23.

A service station contributed five cents on every gallon of gasoline sold on one day. Waterloo city council at a special session voted \$1,200 to the fund and companies made donations.

Will Televis Report Of Dulles

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower today arranged for the report of State Secretary Dulles to the cabinet on the European defence conference to be televised and broadcast nationally tonight.

The cabinet meeting, scheduled for 7 p. m. EST, will be the first ever given national TV and radio coverage.

The White House said the arrangements were made in response to requests from networks for permission to cover the cabinet meeting. NBC and CBS radio and TV will carry the meeting from 7 to 7:30 p. m. and ABC will re-broadcast it on radio at 9:30 p. m.

The full cabinet will be present except for Vice-President Nixon who is campaigning in Idaho for the Nov. 2 congressional election and foreign aid administrator Harold Stassen, who is in Europe.

Dulles flew back from Europe today.

Warns Against Power Of Control Organ

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—India's V. K. Krishna Menon warned today against creating an international control organ for disarmament which would be more powerful than the UN itself.

Concluding the general debate in the UN General Assembly's political committee on disarmament, Menon said that the control machinery must be set up within the UN charter. It would be inappropriate to think of the control organ as if it were world government.

"It is not possible for the UN to create something more powerful than itself," Menon said.

He suggested each country could pass laws making particular armaments illegal as these arms are banned by a control organ. That would be one way of making control effective.

Before he spoke, Menon circulated a call for a halt on weapons production until a worldwide disarmament pact can be reached.

Eden Praises European Agreements

LONDON (Reuters)—Sir Anthony Eden told the House of Commons today the work of the last seven weeks—since the collapse of the European Defence Community—has resulted in agreements through which "Western unity has been massively reinforced."

Eden was discussing agreements on West German rearmament and sovereignty reached in Paris and in London on Saturday by 15 Western nations which also admitted West Germany to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The British foreign secretary indicated the agreements open the way to settlement of other problems. He said he believes settlement of "broader problems" could "never be achieved so long as Western Europe remains perplexed and divided."

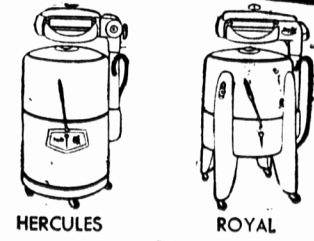
