Duplessis Announces Huge New Iron Ore Development

QUEBEC (CP) - Cartier Mining, a subsidiary of United States Steel Corporation, is ready to start this spring on a \$200,000,000 iron ore mining development north of Shelter Bay, Que., Premier Duplessis said Friday.

The premier made the announcement during a press conference. He described the project 300 miles northeast of Quebec City as a "colossal" undertaking.

The construction schedule calls for completion of the project by 1961.

A spokesman at the mines department said a major aspect of the project is the construction of large iron ore concentrating plants on the mining site. The plants will produce high-grade iron ore pellets from low-grade deposits with an iron-ore content of about 30 per cent.

The project is the largest of its kind since Iron Ore Company of Canada undertook five years ago, at a cost of \$250,000,000, to mine rich deposits of iron ore straddling the Quebec-Labrador boundary.

Cartier Mining's site is located entirely in Quebec on an area southwest of IOCC's deposits. Claims owned by the company extend as far north as Mount Wright, 220 air miles north of Shelter Bay.

Mr. Duplessis said a ship-loading centre will be established at Shelter Bay, a quiet little village on the shores of the St. Lawrence River. The project also calls for a 150-mile railway to the first mining site, 70 miles south of Mount Wright, a mining town, and a hydro-electric power plant on the Hart Jaune River.

Reserves of low-grade ore were reported to be enormous throughout the area.

Mr. Duplessis said Cartier Mining is a company incorporated in Ontario. A new company will be incorporated in Quebec Province to operate the development. Its name will be the Quebec Cartier Mining Company.

Work will start on the project "as soon as the snow melts."

Support of M.P.'s Urged By Railway Pensioners

A resolution calling for vigorous support by the Island members of Parliament and Senators to legislation approved by the Commons and Senate Labor Committee, was passed at the monthly meeting of the Retired Railway Veterans Association held in the recreation hall at the C. N. R. Station yesterday afternoon.

In presenting the matter before the largely attended meeting, the president Louis J. MacDonald quoted the communication dealing with the subject as received by the vice president Michael G. Mooney reading as follows: "Under date of July 23 1956, the Public Relations Department of the Canadian National Railways reported that the House of Commons and the Senate Labor Committee has approved legislation to the effect that the allowance be increased for all retired Railway veterans or their survivors."

Pocket Mouse Is Found In Sask.

REGINA (CP) - The pocket mouse—a rodent not previously known to make its home in Saskatchewan—has been discovered recently near Sceptre in the southwest section of the province.

Eighteen of the species were captured by hand by Dr. Robert W. Nero, assistant director of the Saskatchewan Museum of Natural History, and Richard Fyfe, museum extension officer, while they were searching for kangaroo rats.

The pocket mouse—it got its name because of two fur-lined pockets on the lower jaw—is one of three mammals found in Saskatchewan that have fur-lined cheek pouches. The others are the kangaroo rat and the pocket gopher.

A small, vegetarian animal with a medium-length tail, long hind legs and small forelegs, the pocket mouse is not easy to distinguish from other mice without close examination.

The Saskatchewan species are white-bellied with yellowish sides and olive-brown backs.

Dr. Nero said the rodent's cheek pockets puff out as food is rapidly stuffed into them. When they seem about to burst, the mouse scurries away, unloads the food and returns for more.

The death rate among pocket mice is enormous, with many of the species dying before they are many months old. Some have been known to live six or seven years in captivity.

Coyotes, skunks foxes and owls are their chief enemies.

Light Will Keep Fall Cabbages Looking Green

WINNIPEG (CP) - Manitoba vegetable growers have "seen the light."

The growers have installed artificial lighting, or use natural light, in refrigerated storehouses to keep early fall cabbages green and fresh for local marketing in winter months.

Before well-lighted storage was recommended by Robert Hikada of the University of Manitoba's plant science department, the growers were unable to compete against imported cabbages.

Cabbages picked in Texas during December and January would arrive on the Canadian market fresh. The September - October Manitoba cabbage harvest had to be sold immediately after it was picked. Any surplus was spoiled in storage.

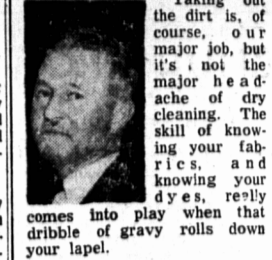

All the dirt removed from Canadian clothes in a year would, they tell me, fill more than 25 box cars.
