GUIDES PREPARED

The executive hoped that with the approval of the government these texts would be placed in all schools of the Province by January, 1960.

MILK YIELD
Danish cows, in 1957, had the highest average yield of butterfat in Europe—175 kilograms (nearly 385 lb.—according to a survey prepared by the Secretariat of the Danish Milk Recording Societies. Swedish cows gave the second highest yield—169 kg (364 lb.—and Dutch cows the third highest—161 kg (355 lb.).

MORE SHEEP
World sheep numbers increased slightly less than 15 million head or about 1 per cent, during 1958 to set record again in 1959. Numbers now total about 967 million.

The U.S.S.R. again accounted for most of the increase as the total there jumped 8 per cent from 120 million to almost 130 million. Even with this substantial gain, and the Soviet Union's continued emphasis on livestock production, Russian sheep still are not as numerous as Australia's.

FALL CLEAN-UP

This will be followed by the election of the new executive.



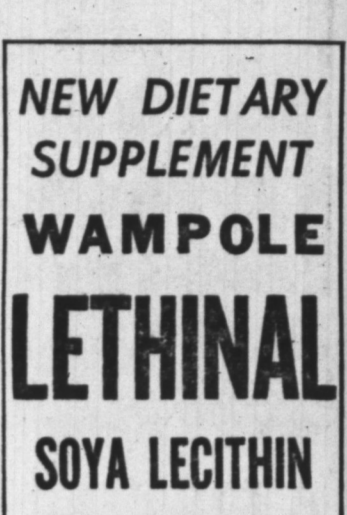
