Afro-Asian Affairs Expert To Address Canadian Club

Brigadier Stephen Longrigg, MA, BLit., will be the guest speaker at this month's meeting of the Canadian Club of P.E.I. to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel Tuesday, Feb. 9 starting at 7 p.m. The topic of his address will be "Africa 1965."

Brig. Longrigg spent 13 years in the British Army and 14 years in the International oil industry during which he spent most of his time in the Middle East and Africa.

A graduate of Oxford University, he speaks a number of languages, including Arabic and Turkish, and has made a close study of the various countries in which he has lived, mixing with the populations at all levels.

Brig. Longrigg has written a number of historical works, for which he was honored with a doctorate by Oxford. He has also lectured widely since 1950 to universities and specialized audiences.

Main publications by Brig. Longrigg, in addition to articles, contributions to Encyclopedia Britannica, etc., published lectures, reviews, etc., are Four Centuries of Modern Iraq; Shore History of Eritrea, 1900 to 1950; Oil in the Middle East; Syria and Lebanon under French Mandate, etc.

By repeated visits to the Middle East and Africa since his retirement, as well as by study, he has kept his close contact with their affairs up to date. He has visited the U.S. and Canada on lecture tours and for conferences seven times in recent years. He is well known to American audiences as a brilliant and interesting speaker. He was awarded the Lawrence of Arabia medal for his services to the Arab world.

22 Per Cent SDU Graduates Further Studies

Figures released by St. Dunstan's University reveal that more than 22 per cent of last year's graduating class is at present engaged in post-graduate study in Canada, the United States and England.

Rev. V.G. Murnaghan, dean of studies at SDU, said last night, "Of last year's graduating class of 63 students, 14 are now taking graduate work. This is an average of over 22 per cent and compares favorably with other Canadian universities offering general courses."

He said, "As long as our students have the required marks, they have no difficulty in being accepted at the best post-graduate schools in Canada and the United States."

Father Murnaghan mentioned the following as some of the universities where SDU students have taken and are now taking graduate work: Dalhousie, UNB, McGill, the University of Toronto, Queen's, Ottawa, McMaster, Alberta, Fordham, Manhattan, Springfield, Boston College, Boston University, Columbia, Notre Dame, the Catholic University of America and Dublin University.

Also included in the above figure is Rhodes Scholarship winner Colin McMillan of Charlottetown, at present studying in Oxford University in England.

The other members of last year's class, Father Murnaghan said, are engaged in teaching, employment in government, business or industry, religious life, or in the armed forces.

All Wards Will Vote

Elmer Blanchard, chief returning officer for the city, will head a crew of 17 deputy returning officers and clerks manning the 17 polls to be set up in all six wards in next week's elections.

With four nominations Wednesday for three posts as Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply, an election will be necessary in Wards 1, 2, 3 and 6 as well as Wards 4 and 5, as the commissioners are elected for the city at large.

City Comptroller John Butler yesterday began the task of obtaining and assigning deputy returning officers.

With a long list of nominations one of the biggest jobs connected with the election will be the counting of ballots in Ward 5. On the ballot form in that ward will be the names of six candidates for the three Council seats and names of the four candidates for the Water Commission.

By comparison, the Ward 4 ballot will have the names of only three candidates for two Council seats and the names of the four candidates for Water Commissioners. The other four wards will have ballots bearing the names of Water Commission candidates only.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Mother St. Bernadine.

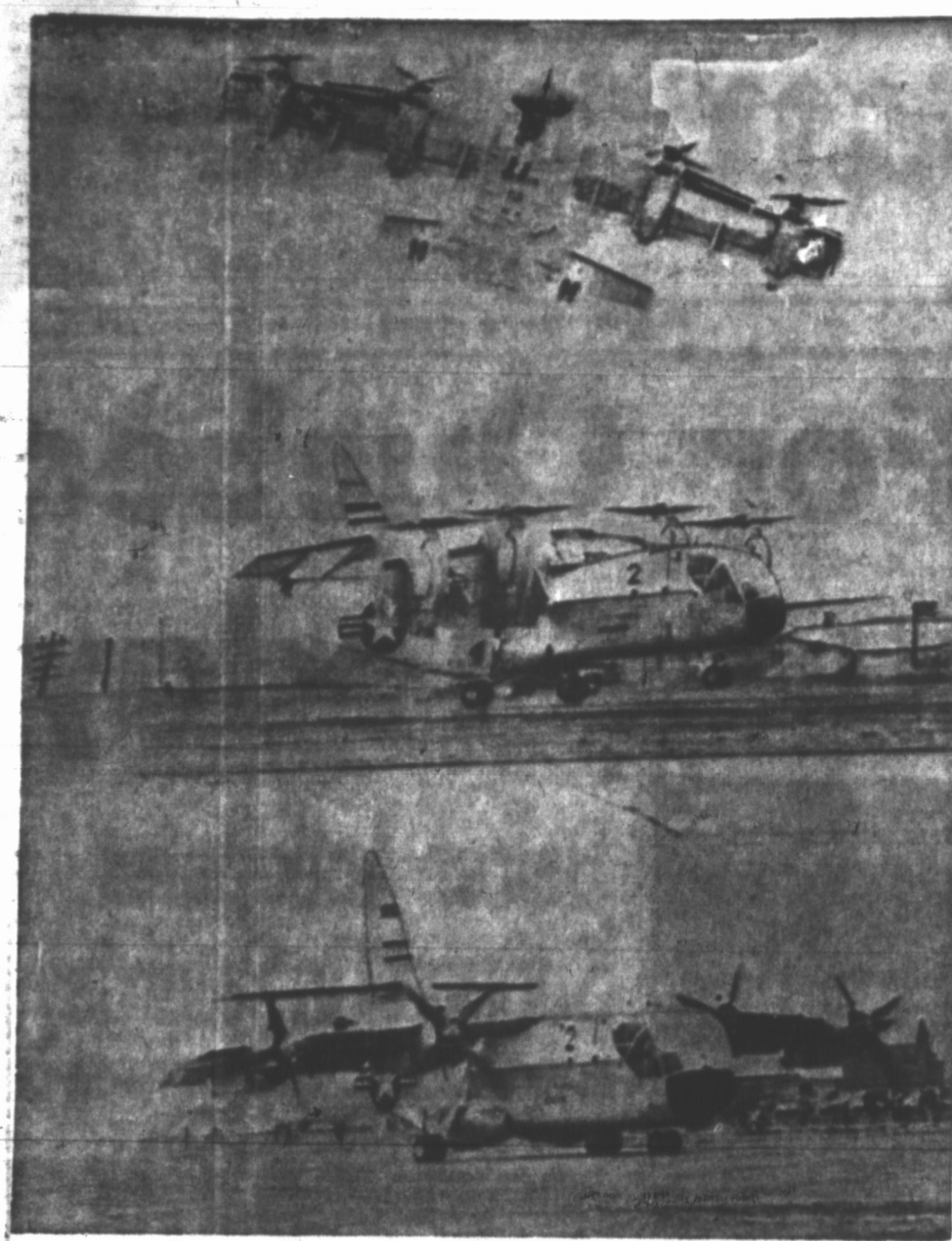
1967 PROJECTS

Building Permits Over \$831,000

Building permits issued in the Village of Sherwood were in excess of \$831,000 for 1964. The permits included work done in construction, repair and additions done in the village.

This was reported at the annual meeting of the village ratepayers.

The meeting, held Feb. 2, was chaired by the chief commissioner, John F. MacAleer, and reports were presented by the chairmen of the various departments. The largest group of ratepayers ever to attend the annual meeting was present to hear the chairman of the finance committee, George Smith, report that the year ended with an overall surplus of \$4,852 in the operating account.

A budget of \$56,480 was approved for 1965.

Another highlight of the meeting was a unanimous vote of congratulatory to a resident of the village, Mrs. Fred G. Osborne, on the occasion of her having been named "Islander of the Year".

Born in Tracadie, Prince Edward Island, she lived in West Rossby before moving to Quincy 25 years ago.

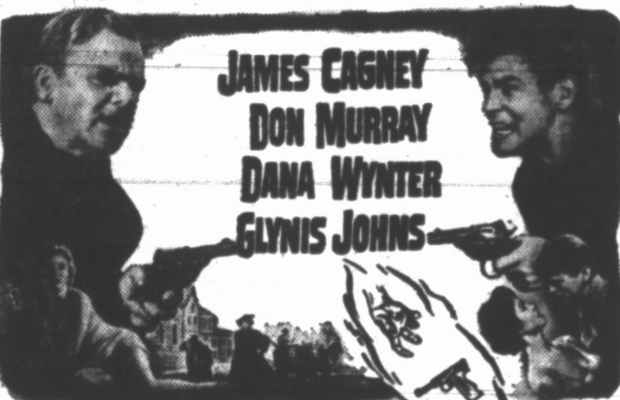
She was a member of the Ladies Sodality of Our Lady of Good Council Church and St. Dunstan's club of Boston.

CIVIC ELECTION

Voter's Lists have been prepared for the Civic Election to be held on Wednesday, February 10th, 1965, and will be posted for inspection of all electors at the City Court, City Building, up to and including Monday, February 8th, 1965, from 11:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. daily.

QUALIFICATIONS OF ELECTORS

All persons, especially wives or husbands qualified to vote under (b) below, and non tax payers such as men aged over 60 voting on rental qualifications only, should see that they are registered with the Electoral Officer in order to have their names on the Voter's List.

All voters qualified as below must be 21 years of age, residents of the City for one year, (except non-residents occupying business premises), Canadian citizens, and not in arrears of taxes at December 31st, last.

QUALIFIED VOTERS, SUBJECT TO ABOVE, ARE:

- (a) Owners or joint-owners (for three months previous to election day) of real estate in the City to the extent of \$500.00 assessed value.
- (b) Wife or husband of such an owner if the owner be entitled to vote.
- (c) Men renting premises in the City of a yearly rental of at least \$100.00 and having rented such in the City for the three month previous to Election Day.
- (d) Women who have been assessed for Civic taxes for the past year and not in arrears as above. This includes those who have paid Education Tax.
- (e) Men who have paid Educational Tax for the past year.
- (f) Non-residents of the City if otherwise qualified as above and doing business and occupying business premises in the City.

MULTIPLE VOTING

Persons voting on (a) (b) (c) (d) or (f) above may vote in each Ward in which they are so qualified.

Persons voting on (e) above may vote in the Ward of which they are a resident.

Property or rental qualifications having removed to another Ward within three months next preceding date of election, entitles vote in the former Ward only.
