Sox Rally In Tenth To Defeat Detroit Tigers 7-4; Cleveland & Senators Win

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
NEW YORK, July 24—Boston Red Sox pulled the Tigers out of third place in the American League and into a tie for fourth today by coming from behind at Detroit to win a 7-4 10-inning decision with a three-run rally in the extra frame.

The result enabled the idle Chicago White Sox to take third place in the league and brought the Red Sox out of the second division.

Tailing 3-1 going into the eighth inning, the Sox finally solved Vic Sorrell, and completed the win against Roxie Lawson. Jimmy Foxe belted his 27th homer in the eighth with none on.

Tibs Humble's 16-3 at Cleveland, the Indians flied their heavy-hitting barrage at the helpless Philadelphia Athletics and picked up half a game on the American League lead with a 16-3 victory.

They smashed out 22 hits, including Earl Averill's 17th homer, to score in every inning but the fifth and pull up to 7 1-2 games behind the idle New York Yankees.

Denny Galehouse held the A's to seven hits for seven innings. Bob Feller, 17-year-old rookie, took over the job for the last two, and after a feeble start held the Mackmen helpless.

The Indians found the offerings of Dusty Rhodes and Rocco Flythe easy to solve, getting 13 hits off the former and nine in the three innings Flythe was on the mound.

If Washington's sluggers had not opened up on Earl Caldwell in the last two innings at St. Louis today to pound out a 10-4 victory over St. Louis, Monte Weaver's four-hit pit-thing would have gone for naught, and the three Senators errors in the seventh would have loomed large.

Those three misplays by Kuhel, Lewis and Travis, plus Julius Solter's single, brought in two runs to break a tie and give the Browns a 4-2 advantage. But it didn't last long. Cliff Bolton's homer with two on base accounted for three Washington runs in the eighth—enough to win—and five more runs came over the plate in the ninth.

AUSTIN TO PLAY CRAWFORD IN SINGLES

LONDON, July 24—(AP)—Battle lines were drawn today for the challenge round of the 1936 Davis Cup tennis competition starting tomorrow between Great Britain's top-holding team and Australia.

Machine-like H.W. "Bunny" Austin, who has been a big factor in the last three successive cup conquests, will open the best three out of five series against the veteran Jack Crawford of Australia.

They will be followed on Wimbledon's famed centre court by champion Fred Perry, against the Australian champion, Adrian Karl Quist. For the final singles matches on Sunday the players will swap opponents.

Naming of Quist at the official draw today occasioned some surprise. Quist twisted his ankle in the inter-zone final against Germany's Gottfried V-n Cramm last Saturday and was forced to withdraw from the remainder of the competition.

It was expected his place again would be taken by Vivian McGrath. However, Quist practiced at Wimbledon this morning to see how the ankle would hold up. "I think it's all right," Quist said afterwards. "I think I'm quite fit to play tomorrow."

Although competitors for the doubles do not have to be named until one hour before the match on Monday, it was believed that Crawford and Quist would take the line against England's combination, Pat Hughes and Charlie Tuckey.

11 Horses To Start In Classic

CHICAGO, July 24—(AP)—Arlington's Park \$30,000 Added Classic Stakes, which annually clear up the three-year-old championship, today drew a field of 11, including three fillies, for its eighth running tomorrow. The classic, 1 1/4 miles feature of Arlington's 30-day race meeting, will have a value of \$36,425 should all go to the post, with \$28,900 going to the first one home.

William Woodward's Granville, coupled with the imported Isolator, probably will go to the post favorite. The Belmont Stakes winner, which earlier earned the hard luck title of the division by losing his jockey in the Kentucky Derby and losing in a close finish to Bold Venture in the Preakness, is leading in the race for the three-year-old title and a victory in the classic will give its owner his third classic triumph.

John Hay Whitney's Mr. Bones will have his backing as will Hal Price Headley's Hollyrod, winner of both the Detroit and Chicago Derbies.

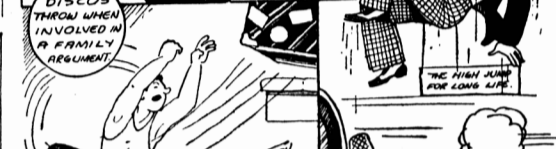

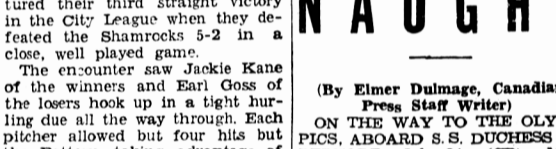

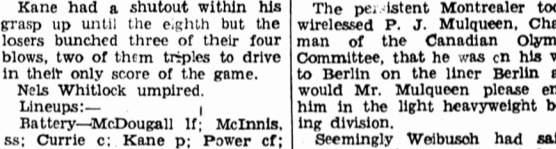

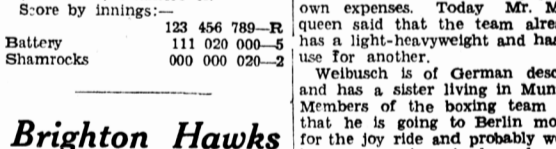

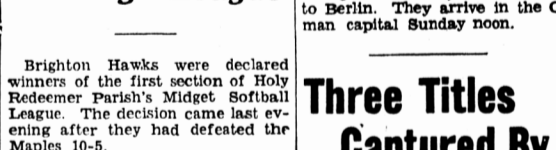

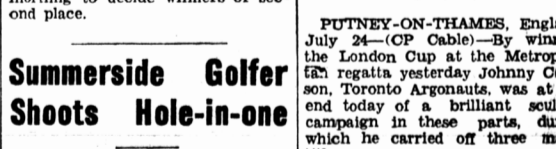

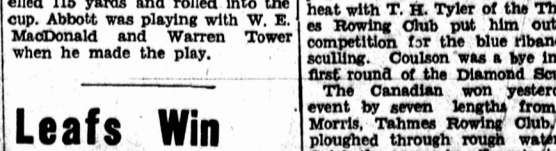

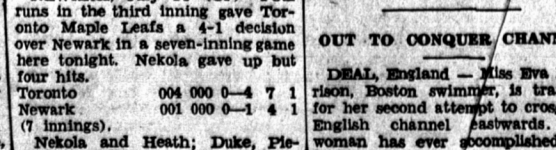
THE TRIPLE JUMP WHEN YOU STOP ON YOUR OWN FEET

Typhoid Epidemic In U. S. City

LOWELL, Mass., July 24—Dr. John J. McNamara, City Health Director, said tonight an outbreak of typhoid here, which resulted in one death, was traced to a milk handler.

Forty persons are under treatment for the disease. One is a Lawrence resident, one lives in Lynn and the others are residents of Lowell.

Dr. McNamara said the milk handler was "not clinically ill," but laboratory tests showed he has "the organism typhoid in his person."
