Rev. J. D. Davison Guest Speaker At Montague Service

Rev. J. D. Davison, pastor of the Baptist Church, Charlottetown, was the guest speaker at the second meeting of the Universal Week of Prayer services conducted in Montague last night.

The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, with Lic. William Johnston, presiding.

The meeting opened with a song service under the leadership of the choir director, Mr. F. G. MacIntyre, with Miss. Clemmie MacLean as organist. The hymns were "Sweet Hour of Prayer," "My Hope is Built," and "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name".

The hymn "Beautiful Garden of Prayer" was sung by the choir which was composed of members of the various choirs in the town.

The Scripture reading was by Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, Minister of Trinity United Church, and was followed by prayer by Rev. F. N. Young, minister of the Presbyterian Church.

Rev. Mr. Davison, continuing the theme of the prayer, took as his text the Lord's Prayer, dividing it into two parts, adoration and petition, and stressing the need of continuous prayer in our lives. The meeting closed with the benediction by Rev. Paul Richardson, minister of New Glasgow Christian Church.

200 War Orphans Given New Start In Swiss Village

GENEVA, Jan. - (Reuters) - Three thousand feet up in the beautiful hills of Northeastern Switzerland is a unique village—the international village of children.

In peace and quiet, learning both their rs and a trade by which they earn their living later on, are about 200 children—all orphans from eight war-torn countries of Europe.

At Pestalozzi, children whose futures once held nothing but poverty and fear, now face the world with hope and faith. Founder of this international village is Dr. Walter Corti, a Swiss scientist and author. In 1944, while Europe was still ravaged by war, Dr. Corti wrote an article in which he called for aid for the hundreds and thousands of children wandering across the continent, hungry, dirty, ragged, sleeping in the ruins of bombed-out buildings, stealing and pilfering as they went.

Quick Response

The response from the Swiss was spontaneous. From many communes in Switzerland came offers of land; from both young and old came donations of money and from all over the world came volunteers to help build the village.

The site was eventually chosen and the village was called Pestalozzi, after the great 18th century Swiss Humanitarian and Philanthropist, Heinrich Pestalozzi.

The children remain at the village until they have completed their education. But if they have surviving relatives they return each year to keep contact with life in their home country.

There are 12 houses in the village, with 16 orphans living in each. They are cared for by house parents and helpers of their own nationality. They are brought up in the customs and traditions of their countries, and in the faith into which they were born.

Mornings are devoted to lessons and during the afternoons all the children in the village meet for sports, games, dancing and excursions.

Government Backs Novel Experiment In Child Welfare

PLYMOUTH, England, Jan. 9 - (CP) - The Mayflower, attractive country house high on a hill overlooking Plymouth, takes many women on a voyage of discovery to a new life.

Charged with child neglect, the women are sent here for a three to four-month course in practical motherhood and home-making. They are taught cooking, sewing, laundrying and housework generally.

The youngest children are allowed to accompany their mothers and take part in the training. They have a well-equipped nursery and out-door playground. Run by the Salvation Army and sponsored by the Home Office, "The Mayflower" is an experiment which has been described as a "proved success." Home Secretary Chuter Ede said more such homes will be opened as soon as possible.

Alternative To Prison Women are sent to The Mayflower as an alternative to a prison sentence and probationary officers say the experiment has resulted in fewer "neglected" children being placed in government institutions. At present, only child neglect cases, not involving cruelty, are admitted to the home.

Major Newcombe, matron in charge, said that of the 50 mothers and 100 children admitted so far, only one mother has reappeared in court. "Often," she said, "mothers arrive in rags. They've spent what little money they have on their children's clothing."
