WHAT IS MEANT.—Holmes & Butcher vs. Clarke & Robblee is a case in which the plaintiffs sought to recover in the city court on a promissory note, dated at Summerside, P. E. I., but payable here, and given by the defendants to the plaintiffs; in the city court it was decided that the phrase "cause of action" in our city court act includes making and delivering of the note as well as breach of the contract. Judge Waters reversed this decision, holding the breach of the contract constituted a "cause of action," and ordered a verdict for the plaintiffs. On application of Mr. S. Taylor, attorney for defendants, Judge Palmer, yesterday morning, granted a rule nisi for certiorari, returnable in Michaelmas term next.—St. John Telegraph.

RETURNING TO P. E. ISLAND.—Passengers to P. E. Island by the boat from Point du Chene number about 400 per week, exclusive of children. The majority of these are American tourists but many are former residents of P. E. Island returning home for good. A Monctonian on the train to Shediac one day recently ascertained that there were forty or fifty persons on board going back to P. E. I. from different parts of the States. They included six families and 20 to 30 young men and women. The Monctonian talked with several of them, and they said they had been in the States long enough to find out that P. E. Island is the best place for them, and that if they worked as hard in P. E. Island as they are obliged to do in the States they would be better off. IRISH EVICTIONS.

A Lively Time—Wounds and Bruises.

DUBLIN, July 24.
The eviction of tenants was resumed on the Vandeleur estate, County Clare, to-day. All the tenants offered a stout resistance, blocking the doors with beams and boulders. A force of police and soldiers protected the bailiffs, who used a battering ram, advancing to the attack under showers of boiling dirty water and stones. Fights occurred in many cases after the bailiffs effected an entrance. Several persons were wounded on both sides. Several of the neighbors who assisted them were arrested.

The Timber Ship Afloat.

AMHERST, N. S., July 24.
The timber ship is afloat. At 12 o'clock to-day it glided off the ways and was brought to an anchor just off the place where it was built. The day was beautifully fine and from daybreak until the hour at which it was announced the ship would be launched, teams drove up to or as near as they could get to the Finger Board. There were fully four thousand persons on the bank at 12 o'clock, and they watched with interest on the removal of the false work. The ship was examined by nearly every person present. It is a structure of stupendous proportions, being 592 feet in length, measuring 12 feet in diameter at the ends and is 54 feet in width at the centre, and 36 feet in depth. There are 21,300 pieces of piling in it, or nearly three million feet of lumber, and is valued at over \$20,000. Mr. Robertson says the masts will be put in at once, he having been prevented from placing them in position by the seizure of wire by the Government. Two men, Jackson Cotes and Hurd Parsons were launched on the raft. Mr. Robertson says he will commence to build another raft at once.

The Imperial Progress.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 24.
The Czar, Czarina, Grand Dukes Vladimir, Michael, Nicholas and their wives, proceeded on the yacht Alexandria to the yacht Hohenzollern. They were received on board by Prince Henry, who presented bouquets to the Czarina and Grand Duchess after a cruise among the German vessels comprising Emperor William's escort. After farewells, the Russian royalties re-embarked on the Alexandria.

Lord Stanley and suite have returned to Quebec and will remain some weeks at the citadel.
The Marine Department has awarded fifty dollars to the owner, a binocular glass to the captain, a watch to the mate, and fifteen dollars to each of the crew of the barque Wolf of Picou for saving the crew of the brig W. C. Warner.
A copper smelter costing a million and a half dollars is being erected at Sudbury.

Mr. Hutchinson, in which she states that it is her intention to remain in the United States, and that her ministerial friend will, in the near future, be her husband.
