### Nova Scotians Win First Round

The first inter-provincial Junior Golf match between Nova Scotia and the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Association was held yesterday at the Bevedere Golf and Winter Club, Charlottetown.

The combined totals of a morning round of two ball foursome medal play and an afternoon round of single medal play was Nova Scotia 19.5 and N.B.-P.E.I. 15.5.

The matches were played by eight representatives of each association ranging in age from thirteen to eighteen. The morning round of two ball matches were won by N.S., seven points to four after a seesaw battle. This is the first of a planned annual series of the joint development programmes of each association.

In the two-ball foursome M. Mahaney and P. Chandler from Nova Scotia defeated J. Boudreau and R. Irwin, N.B.-P.E.I. 2 1/2 points to 1/2; R. Garrett and C. Shaw, N.B.-P.E.I. defeated G. Upon completing his studies in the religious brotherhood, Brother Shea plans to dedicate his life as a Religious Brother to the foreign missions. He is the son of Mrs. Gerald Shea and the late Gerald Shea of Waterford.

# Centre Theatre Audience Hears Atlantic Orchestra

The Atlantic Orchestra under the direction of John Fenwick chose a program of orchestral concertos for last evening's concert at Confederation Centre Theatre. Although one usually considers a concerto a work for solo instrument and orchestra, Mr. Fenwick explained that its original conception was that of a strictly orchestral work whose interest often lay in putting various sections of the orchestra against the entire group or against each other.

Opening the program was the third of the specially commissioned works, "Piece Concertante No. 1" by young Canadian composer Norma Beecroft. In this work Miss Beecroft divided the orchestra generally into choirs, or blocks of sound; strings, brass, woodwinds, organ (electronic colour), percussion. Each sound had its brief statement and then faded back into the color of the whole. An intriguing and interesting work, the orchestra played it well and captured its dramatic flavor.

The Handel "Concerto Gross in B flat Op. 7" did not fare so well. Although the orchestra played sections of it very well, especially the "Andante", on the whole the reading of the work remained uninteresting. Part of this may be traced to lack of precision on attacks, especially in the first movement, and in general sloppiness in intonation. The spirit of the work was caught in the "Andante" with its strong bass line and terraced dynamics.

C.P.E. Bach's "Concerto for Orchestra in D" was next on the program. The work was rediscovered in the early 1900's, but its original scoring was laid aside and the work was rescored by Maxwell Steinberg. This modern scoring was perhaps my only criticism of the work and its performance. It sounded at times like a work by Rachmaninoff, due primarily to the intricate use of the strings in the second movement. Although the work was played well, it lost its essence as a work of the 18th century in the translation to 20th century scoring.

The ballet was choreographed by Diaghilev with sets by Picasso and presented in Paris in 1920.

In the work a quintet of strings functions as a sort of concertina against the rest of the strings and the winds. It is a tonal and melodic work in which the particular sound of Stravinsky becomes more apparent as the work progresses, culminating in the very difficult and demanding finale.

In this work the orchestra again had difficulties, partly technical, but also difficulty in capturing the essence of the work. This problem disappeared, though, as surface reading gave way to complete involvement in the score. Then the work became tremendously thrilling, not only for performers, but also for the audience.

### CADETS CAUSE FIRE

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP) — Five live artillery shells fired by cadet trainees from the U.S. military academy here landed in a recreation area in Bear Mountain State Park last Friday and set off a brush fire, an academy spokesman said Thursday. The spokesman said a "human error" by one of the trainees in overloading a 105-mm. howitzer apparently caused the shells to overshoot the target by about 6,500 yards.

WHO ARE THE MEMBER AGENCIES OF THE UNITED FUND?  
HOW DOES AN ORGANIZATION BECOME A MEMBER?
