

Fire Sweeps Tokyo Area

TOKYO (AP) — Fire swept through an industrial area in southern Tokyo Tuesday night, touching off blasts from explosives and gasoline. Police said eight persons were killed, 14 missing and 45 injured.

The fire, at Shinagawa, razed 10 warehouses containing explosives. One gasoline tank went up in flames.

The fire was extinguished after a three-hour fight.

Police are investigating the cause.

Nfld. Fish Plant Damaged By Fire

HARBOR GRACE, Nfld. (CP) — A fire Tuesday ripped through the third story of the North Eastern Fish Industries Limited plant here, causing an estimated \$100,000 damage. No injuries were reported.

Cause of the fire was not known but Provincial Fire Commissioner Frank Ryan said he will conduct an investigation.

Fire fighting apparatus from Harbor Grace and St. John's fought the blaze.

North Eastern Fisheries is the major buyer of fish for the Conception and Trinity Bay areas.

Car Factories Getting Ready For New Models

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian car and truck production is beginning to drop as manufacturers tool up for the 1965 model year, says the Motor Vehicle Manufacturers' Association, formerly the Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce.

Scheduled car and truck production for the week ending July 12 is 5,604 units compared with 12,446 units the previous week, and 13,681 the previous week.

For the year to date, however, car and truck production is a record 449,208 units compared with 374,797 produced during the corresponding period of 1963.

U.K. Minister Has Criticism Of Washington

LONDON (Reuters) — Transport Minister Ernest Marples Wednesday night attacked the U.S. Federal maritime commission for acting as if the United States has the right to regulate the affairs of the world as a whole.

He asked the House of Commons to agree to a bill to combat the commission's demands that British shippers should cancel contracts because they infringed U.S. anti-trust laws.

The bill empowers ministers to order British shippers under penalty of fines up to £1,000 (\$3,000) not to comply with American and other foreign shipping laws which they consider infringe British jurisdiction.

It also protects British shippers against the commission's demands for information about freight rates on the grounds they might be contrary to the commercial interests of the U.S.

Marples said the bill was not regulatory but necessary by U.S. government actions which encroached on British jurisdiction.

Many of the contracts whose form the commission was trying to dictate were between British exporters and shippers based in Britain, he said.

"Can it really be wondered that we object?"

Crash Probe Continuing

OTTAWA (CP) — Investigation into the Nov. 20 Air Canada crash near Montreal with a loss of 118 lives is not expected to be completed until mid-September, Transport Minister Pickersill said Wednesday in the Commons.

Replying to Leon Balcer, former Conservative transport minister, Mr. Pickersill said the investigation will determine only facts and not allocate blame.

The minister said 90 per cent of the DC-8 jet's structure has been accounted for in the biggest investigation in Canadian aviation history. Some items were being processed in laboratories.

PLAY TITLE ANGLICIZED

TRAFORD, Ont. (CP) — The Stratford Festival will announce the title of Moliere's *Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme*, one of the three plays in its current repertoire, to convey to the public that it is being performed in English.

Victor G. Polley, administrative director said the festival previously had rejected using the English title *The Bourgeois Gentleman* — under the impression the original title would be familiar to Canadians and Americans.
