## Designated Area Plan Is Rapped By Premier

Capital Bureau The Guardian OTTAWA — Premier Walter Shaw took the stand at the Federal-Provincial conference that there is a higher rate of unemployment in Prince Edward Island than labor department statistics indicate. Premier Shaw said that "people come to the centers for employment and trickle back to the farms and villages and become either employed or only partially employed."

Premier Shaw made it very clear that Prince Edward Island is not very happy with the federal government's "designated areas" program.

He urged that there should be a greater degree of consultation between the federal and provincial governments so that there was a clearer and more complete understanding of the situation.

"We are working for a more adequate system of consultation so that people in the areas affected will have some voice in these decisions," the premier said.

## Mullally Reports Patients Must Pay

John Mullally, MP for Kings reported Thursday there is no possibility of having the \$50 an hour air fee for emergency ambulance cases paid through the hospital commission.

Mr. Mullally has been looking into the question of the change in the system whereby P.E.I. residents who require sudden hospitalization must now deal with a Moncton-based commercial air service rather than the RCAF.

Last week he said he hoped to find that the \$50 an hour fee charged by the private company in such cases would be recovered by patients through the hospital services commission.

"I have been advised by officials of the department of national health and welfare that this is not possible," Mr. Mullally said.

"The regulations which govern this service, a joint provincial-federal affair, do not provide payment for ambulatory services, including that of the air service."

Mr. Mullally said that in any event, P.E.I. citizens who require such a service will be looked after. If the private service cannot supply a plane when required, or if any difficulty arises in obtaining the private service, the RCAF is still prepared to step in and see that any emergency cases are properly looked after.

## Stolen Cars Are Recovered

Two cars reported stolen in the city on Tuesday and Wednesday have been recovered by the city police, Police Chief Stevens Webster revealed yesterday.

A 1962 Comet belonging to Mrs. Harold Shaw, of 89 Upper Prince Street, was recovered by Const. Charles Ready of city police about 3:15 Thursday afternoon. The car was found on Kirkwood Drive West.

A second car, a 1963 dark blue Chevy II, the property of Leigh Thompson, 201 Belvedere Ave., was recovered in a parking lot off Windward Street about 8:30 a.m. yesterday.

The keys had been left in both cars when they were stolen and were still in them when the cars were recovered.

## Building Unaffected By Weather

Despite lowering temperatures and the generally inclement weather work on the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building complex continues to move along on schedule.

Work is expected to get underway on the large roof of the theatre building next week, and stripping of the roof on the art gallery will start today. B.M. Rickard, construction superintendent for Pigott Construction said yesterday.

A crew of about 250 men with an approximate weekly payroll of \$33,000 is employed by Pigott Construction on the project. Sub-

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trade employees account for some out stone on the theatre building had to be removed faster. cleaning when stained due to a break of a cable last week.
