Higher Milk Production Standard Seen Forthcoming For Canadians

Canadian milk producers can look forward to higher production standards in the coming years, Dr. K.C. Johns of Ottawa told a meeting of Island producers last evening.

Dr. Johns, speaking at a meeting at the Vocational Technical Institute sponsored by the P.E.I. Department of Agriculture, said Canada was under a handicap in competing with such areas as Holland, New Zealand and Scandinavia, because their standards of milk health and sanitation of milk and dairy equipment.

He said under the National Food and Drug Act, the bacteriological count allowed in milk supplied to Canadian consumers was 15 times as high as that in competitive countries.

Dr. Johns, one of Canada's best-known experts on milk sanitation, is technical advisor for the Ottawa branch of Lenzus Laboratories, New York.

He retired last year from the Canadian department of agriculture following 36 years work as a bacteriologist.

He stressed the importance of controlling disease and spoilage bacteria in milk by washing containers, milking machines, and other equipment with clean.

Suspended Sentence Given in Theft Case

GEORGETOWN — Kings County Stenographer Magistrate James B. Johnson, QC, had a large docket before him here Wednesday.

The crown in all cases was represented by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGowan, QC.

Joseph Gladstone Vuozzo, of Valleyfield, charged with break, enter and theft, and represented by William A. Reddin, and who had previously pleaded guilty, was given a two-year suspended sentence, and entered into a recognizance in the amount of \$500 with two sureties to keep the peace.

James Malcolm MacLeod of Valleyfield, represented by Mr. Reddin, who earlier entered plea of not guilty to a charge of break, enter and theft, by judge without a jury, had Nov. 12 at 7:30 p.m., set as date for preliminary hearing.

CASES DISMISSED
Larry Wayne Fraser of Montague, represented by Mr. Reddin, pleaded not guilty to hunting migratory birds in a closed season and the evidence of RCMP Constable David Power was heard for the crown. The accused gave evidence as did James Sampson. The magistrate dismissed the case.

The case of James Gary Sampson of Charlottetown, also represented by Mr. Reddin, charged with the same offence as Fraser, was dismissed with out evidence being taken when the crown and the defence agreed to accept the same evidence as in the Fraser case.

Bookings Produce (Montague) Ltd., which previously pleaded guilty to a charge of failing to file income tax returns, was sentenced by Mr. Reddin and was fined \$75 and costs or 30 days.

THEFT OF \$100 BILL
Francis Colin MacLeod of Southport, charged with theft of a \$100 United States bill, elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty. He was given a two year suspended sentence and ordered to enter into a \$500 bond with two sureties. The case was adjourned to Charlottetown on Oct. 28 for execution of the bond.

Douglas Allan Youker of Southport, charged with possession of stolen goods, the case being the \$100 United States bill, elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty. He was given a two year suspended sentence and ordered to enter into \$500 bond with two sureties. The case was adjourned to Charlottetown on Oct. 28 for execution of the bond.

Charlottetown Lions Consider Boys' Club

Ernest Cotton of Moncton, N.B., a supervisor for the Boys' Clubs of Canada in the Maritime Provinces, was the guest speaker at the regular dinner meeting of the Charlottetown Lions Club at the Charlottetown Hotel last night.

The local Lions Club, at present exploring the possibilities of sponsoring a boys' club in this city, invited Mr. Cotton to speak to their group on the aims and objects and organizational aspects of such an organization.

Speaking of the high values that the formation of boys' clubs have brought to communities across the North American continent, Mr. Cotton pointed out that the first step is to ascertain, through proper survey, if there is a need for a boy's club.

"If there is no need then let's not waste time and money," the speaker stated, "but if there is a need then let's do something about it" he continued. "If you believe in the future - you believe in boys - do all you can for them."

NOT FOR DELINQUENTS
He pointed out that one of the attractive features of such a club, is that the individual boy feels that it is "his" club and reminded his listeners of that nostalgic feeling that most of them had for the treasured or shack in the neighborhood backyard in their early youth. "It is not a club for delinquents," he stated, "it is for all boys who wish to join it, but where these clubs have developed, delinquency has dropped sharply. Boys' Clubs of Canada are non-sectarian and non-political in character."

During his address, Mr. Cotton stated that in the past year and a half 10 new boys' clubs have been started in the Maritimes, stretching from Summerside and Alberton, P.E.I. to Newfoundland, and that at the present time there are some 600 clubs in the United States, and that it is their aim to develop 50 more during the next 10 years at the rate of 50 per year, and that the Canadian organization is affiliated with its counterpart in the U.S.A.

John Evans, representing both the YMCA and the Charlottetown Recreational Council, was present.

Case Goes To Supreme Court
