ROBERTS NORTH OF ZAND RIVER

ADVANCE BEING RAPIDLY CARRIED ON.

Hutton Again Engages the Enemy.

Buller Reported to Have Advanced—Boers are Making a Good Rearguard Fight—May be a Battle at Zand River.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

LONDON, MAY 10.—Lord Roberts reports as follows: "We are across the Zand River. The enemy are still holding a strong position. But we are gradually pushing them back."

A CAREFUL GENERAL.

SMALDEEL, May 8.—Yesterday General Hutton attempted to seize a Boer convoy that was crossing the Zand River. He advanced toward the river with the mounted infantry, including the Canadians.

A long line of wagons was plainly visible. On becoming aware of General Hutton's object the Boers stopped their retreat and opened fire with ten guns. They seemed in great force and threatened Hutton's flank. Presently mounted Boers were seen crossing the dry bed of the River. They circled to the right and began to enfilade the West Australians, while many of the British were hit by the Boer shells. The position became serious.

The Boers sent up reinforcements placing the Australians in danger of being cut off. Thereupon Hunter ordered a retirement to Welegel-gen, where he had left his own convoy.

A portion of the forces advanced and engaged the Boers to cover this retirement which was successfully executed.

The Boers continued to shell the retiring troops, but showed no desire to press the attack further.

Meanwhile the Boer trains steamed away northward blowing up the culverts as they went.

BULLER MOVING.

CAPE TOWN, May 10.—It is reported that General Buller is advancing on the Biggarsberg Pass and that the Boers are withdrawing.

ANOTHER MOVE.

LONDON, May 1.—It is announced from Lorenzo Marques that the government of the Orange Free State has been moved from Kroonstadt to Heilbrun.

WAR NOTES.

LONDON, May 10.—A despatch to the Telegraph from Smaldel, dated Tuesday, May 8th, says:

Stores are being accumulated here. Convoys are proceeding regularly to the north and also to Winburg.

General Hutton's brigade, while skirmishing yesterday, took 60 prisoners.

A despatch post from Ladysmith, dated Wednesday, says:

General Buller has issued a proclamation to both the Dutch rebels and the Burgers who are willing to surrender, notifying them that he will recommend all who now surrender voluntarily for greater leniency than those who continue fighting after this warning.

A despatch to The Times, dated Smaldel, May 8th, says: Lord Roberts has halted here to complete to railway and to allow time for the cavalry now returning from Thaba M'Chu to take the place designated for them in the original scheme of advance.

General Hamilton, last week, was con-

tinually in touch with General Botha's rear guard.

The enemy manoeuvred their field guns skillfully to check General Hamilton's advance.

On one occasion they worked their positions so well as to jeopardize the British convoy, which was saved by the timely arrival of the Highland brigade with naval guns.

The advance on Winburg was so rapid that General Hamilton's advance scouts were overlapping the town before Botha's transports were clear.

But owing to difficulties at the drifts the guns arrived too late to effect the convoy's capture.

It is impossible to say whether the Boers will dispute the passage of the Zand river seriously. But it is known that General Botha has ten guns in front of General Hamilton, and that General De la Rey has six in front of the main advance.

ASHANTI EXPEDITION.

Officers in West Indies Ordered to Join it.

KINGSTON, Ja, May 10.—The military authorities here have received a cable despatch from the British War Office ordering all available officers of the West Indian regiments to proceed immediately by the shortest route to Cape Coast Castle, to join an expedition against the Ashantis.

Death of Alpin Grant.

HALIFAX, May 10.—Mr. Alpin Grant died suddenly while at tea last evening. He was well known in political circles, and was formerly proprietor of the British Colonist, of which Sir Charles Tupper was at one time editor.

MR. GRAY'S CASE.

Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway Survey.

OTTAWA, May 10.—Mr. Blair, replying to Mr. A. Martin, said yesterday that Mr. Gray was an agent on the P. E. Island railway. Tenders had been called for. The highest tender was \$484, but Gray was given a concession at \$360—which was a higher price than his own tender.

Mr. Blair stated that the preliminary survey of the Belfast and Murray Harbor railway was half done and that the work would be proceeded with. Tenders would probably be asked for when the time came for construction.
