Librarian For Children Said Needed At Centre

"Inadequate lighting and poor layout are two of the problems facing the staff of the new Confederation Centre Library," according to Douglas Boylan, Chief Librarian, who spoke at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday.

Mr. Boylan suggested that ideally libraries should be either circular or square, but he added, the shape of the Confederation Centre Library was necessary to conform to the overall plan. The lighting, especially in the Reading Room, was some 40 feet above the tables. However, Mr. Boylan said he hoped that this might be corrected at some future date.

"Many visitors from Nova Scotia in comparing the Charlottetown Library to Halifax, said that, although the Confederation Centre Library was larger, the service did not seem to compare favorably."

Mr. Boylan explained that there were 13 full-time librarians in Halifax but only two in Charlottetown. He suggested that at least one more librarian should be added to the present staff—preferably a children's librarian. He said that the development of a children's library was a major concern. This service had been lacking, and, although they had 3,000 children's volumes, there was no proper direction.

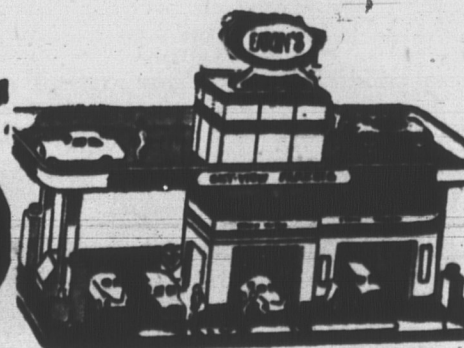

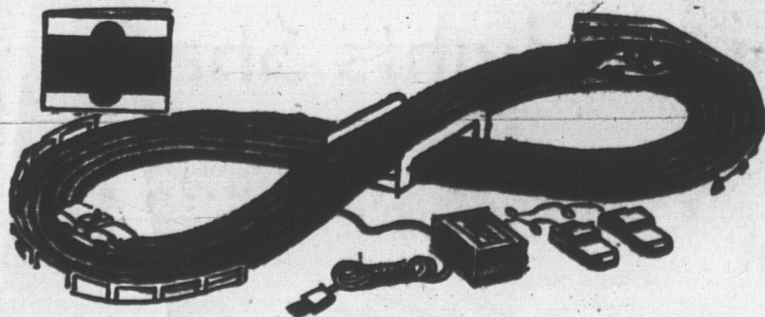
