Telegraphic Odds and Ends.

A BUDDY OF GENERAL NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

LONDON, July 23.—A despatch to the Chronicle says Prince Bismarck, through the German representatives at the Vatican, has dissuaded the Pope from leaving Rome.

PESTH, July 23.—One thousand persons were rendered homeless by yesterday's fire in the town of Laks. Six persons were burned to death. Damage to property amounts to £50,000.

HELENA, July 23.—A tremendous land slide occurred near Miles City, on the Northern Pacific railway on Saturday. A high alkali bank suddenly gave away, and a mass of earth for a distance of 500 feet slid down into the Yellowstone River, completely burying the railroad.

WINNIPEG, July 23.—The recent splendid rains have wonderfully improved the crop prospects in Manitoba. Farmers who three weeks ago expected only half a crop of wheat are now confident of reaping one about average.

MONTREAL, July 23.—The Caspian brought to Montreal yesterday fifty-two young emigrants sent out by the Canadian Catholic Emigration Committee, under the auspices of Cardinal Manning.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Members of the Cronin faction of the Clan-na-Gael held a secret meeting this morning in one of the parlors of the Vanderbilt Hotel, where Luke Dillon, of Philadelphia, is stopping at present. Capt. Edward O'Meara, of Condon, who was at one time sentenced to death for his part in the killing of Sergt. Kelly in Manchester, in 1867, was present.

QUEBEC, July 23.—Augustine Lesage, a farmer of St. Augustine, met his death under peculiar circumstances. He was removing boulders off his property, and had just undermined one huge rock, for it to sink into the ground, when it toppled over, crushing him to death.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 23.—This morning a freight train frightened a horse attached to a spring wagon, standing in front of Abram Zeigler's residence at Harmony, Pa., and the animal backed the wagon over the railroad embankment, throwing its occupants out. Miss Nana Oppenheimer was thrown under the train and instantly killed. Miss Amanda Klee was fatally injured and Miss Netta Wormser and Miss Floenheim badly hurt. The young ladies were the daughters of wealthy parents in Pittsburgh's prominent Jewish society.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—Steamer Belgic arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama this morning. The recent fire at Luchow burned 23 hours and destroyed 87,000 dwellings. Over 1,200 persons perished in the flames, and 400 others were killed. Nearly 17,000 people are obliged to camp out without shelter, and are dying at the rate of 100 a day from want and exposure.

Mrs. Annie McDonald and her sister, Mrs. Hagen, are home on a visit from Boston. They will return in about two months. The haymakers of this place are very much pleased with the amount of hay they gathered this season; and also all their crops are looking beautiful.
