"If we go from Bonshaw to Canoe Cove we get no returns. If we go by Bonshaw we would have to start at DeSable. We are at Bonshaw now and must make the best of it from there."

"It is necessary for plants in such a case to turn out other products," he cited the cases of Central Creameries and the Amalgamated Dairies at Summerside from which the farmer is deriving many benefits on account of their production of new products.

Geological Survey - The Premier touched briefly on the matters of a Geological Survey. He pointed out that the Attorney-General has prepared legislation to provide for the rights of all parties should the survey indicate mineral developments.

With regard to the Treatment Centre at Falconwood he stated there had been an unavoidable delay in the work due to the fact that the architect Mr. E. S. Blanchard had passed away.

"The Government has been unable to ask for tenders until we get specific figures," he stated. Work on the foundation was started in order to qualify for the Federal Health grant that expired last October.

"I believe we can get as much action from Ottawa by presenting our problems honestly and faithfully, by putting before them our needs and showing what we want, not by taking them by the throat," stated Premier Matheson in reference to the Island's efforts to get their fair share from the Federal Government.

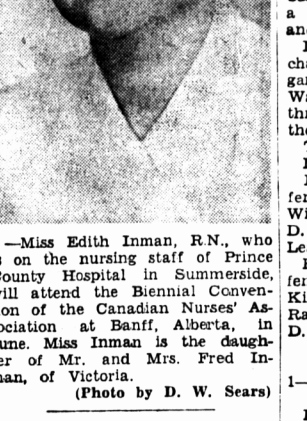

Dalhousie Professor Speaks On Teaching At Summerside - Professor Charles Lindsay Bennett, head of the department of English at Dalhousie University, spoke at the High School auditorium last evening to a group of teachers, parents and children on the means and meanings of teaching.

In his opening he referred to Dr. Hilda Neatby's much discussed book "So Little For The Mind" and said that he neither praised nor condemned it. Pointing out that this book was an indictment of the educational system, he contended that in writing it Dr. Neatby had adopted an attitude of debate, but that the book was written to expose the faults of such an educational system and not to praise the good points.

Denying the present day system of teaching, Professor Bennett said he was old enough to have seen two or three generations of teachers and that in his opinion the standard today is higher, not lower than it was 20 or 30 years ago.

"Canadian teachers," he said, "from coast to coast are a great deal better than the public deserves, considering what they pay them."

He said also that he believed that the young people of today are very much better and have many qualities of which their parents can be proud.

Professor Bennett said he felt that today there is too much emphasis on teaching and not enough on learning. He said he believed that teaching really meant showing other people how to learn, how to obey, how to find out what they can really do best and thus fit into the scheme of things.

Mr. Murray Shanks, principal of Air Marshal Johnson School, R.C.A.P. station, presided and introduced the speaker. He said that Professor Bennett was born in New Zealand, attended high school and university there, and served with the New Zealand army in the First War. He won a scholarship to Cambridge, England, and took an honor course in English there. He came to Dalhousie as lecturer in English in 1922 and, with the exception of two years at Harvard, has been here since.

He has been head of the department of English since 1931. He has edited several high school English texts used in eight of the provinces, including the "Canadian Books of Prose and Verse."

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At the conclusion of the address Mr. Clarence Mercer, supervisor of Summerside High School, moved a vote of thanks to Professor Bennett which was seconded by Mr. James Murphy of the High School.

The second game is expected to be played at O'Leary tonight.

The contest was much closer than the lopsided score would indicate, and Dave McInnis in the Summerside nets won the Holman's Men's Wear "most valuable player award" for his brilliant display. He stopped 43 shots as compared to 21 for MacNeill. The winners showed a little more poise around the cage, however. Al Romaine scored three goals and had one assist to lead the Summerside snipers.

The O'Leary boys outplayed the home forces by a wide margin in the first five minutes, and had an edge on the play all through the first frame. Two of the three goals that beat MacNeill in this period were of the lucky variety. Romaine snipped the second one in from above his shoulder, but as it hit the goalie and caromed in, the tally counted. The third was a poke check rather than a shot, and sneaked in all the way from the blucine. MacNeill got the rubber tangled up in his skates, and while he was in the entangling process Cannon banged it into the twines. The period ended 3-0 for Summerside.

The second period was hard fought and much more even in territorial play than the initial session. The Summerside team outscored the visitors 2-1, but were widely outshot.

In the final period the Aces had the edge, scoring two goals without a return. A third counter was fired by Peter Pope but the referees ruled that Mooney Gallant was in the crease and though the red light flashed the goal was not counted.

Watkins, Canada's ambassador to Russia, and Watkins congratulated Molotov on Russia's 7-2 victory over Canada that gave the Russians the world amateur hockey championship at Stockholm.

Said Watkins afterwards: "He seemed happy at the thought, and said that the Canadians played a good game. He laughed when I replied that they didn't play good enough."

The meeting was to enable Watkins to meet the foreign minister, ask him formally to arrange presentation of his credentials and to hand Molotov a copy of them. The newspaper Pravda carried a two-column account of the game with a picture of the Russian team.
