Protestant Service Bureau Opens Financial Drive Today

Increased financial support of the Protestant Family Service Bureau will have to be forthcoming if the Bureau is to continue operations. This terse statement came yesterday from board chairman K. A. Parker. The Bureau opens its financial drive today.

With the announcement last Saturday of the appointment of Arthur Laws, MSW as executive director of the bureau, Mr. Parker points out that the work of the organization can be carried on only by a trained professional worker.

"Many people," said Mr. Parker, "have inquired, why doesn't the city handle direct relief as in the past?"

The answer he gives to this question is that the distribution of food, fuel, etc. for emergencies is only a stop-gap at best since there is no attempt made to get the cause of the need. Through the bureau, the director initiates a program of rehabilitation for the unfortunate recipients, Mr. Parker points out.

Continuing, the board chairman stated that although the department of welfare provides similar services, due to lack of staff, these services are quite inadequate to meet the demands. It is recognized, he said, that the services of a private agency are with her husband and two sons. Laymen's Speaker Deplores Lowering Moral Standards

"We are faced to-day with a complete revolution in morals, particularly in regard to matters of chastity," Rev. Allan MacDonald told the Basilica Laymen yesterday morning at the annual communion breakfast held at the Community Centre.

The theme of Fr. MacDonald's talk was "The Father as an Educator."

Dr. Leo Killorn, chairman of the Catholic activity committee presided at the well attended breakfast. His Excellency, Bishop MacEachern was present and addressed the men briefly.

LOWERING OF MORALS

The lessening of moral standards in the present day results from misconceptions concerning the nature of man, said Fr. MacDonald. There are two extreme positions concerning the nature of man, both false, and both leading to false attitudes towards children and sex.

One of these holds that man, by original sin has been spoiled. He is depraved, and is capable of nothing that is good. This leads to domination of children by parents. Since of themselves they can do no good, than they must be rigidly and strictly controlled.

At the other extreme is the belief that man is capable of doing no evil. He is capable of nothing but good. Consequently, Fr. MacDonald said, there is no need of direction or instruction for our youth. They can only do good, so allow them complete freedom. This false Liberalism has led to much of the false thinking on the problem of children today, the speaker declared.

The Catholic position stands between these two, he continued. Catholicism holds that man is basically good—the image of God, but he has been weakened by original sin, and can be led to do evil. Thus to be good, children need principles and guides for their actions. They must be given a correct view of marriage, parenthood and sex, Fr. MacDonald said.

AVOIDING RESPONSIBILITY

It is a known fact, continued Fr. MacDonald, that parents, and particularly fathers are avoiding their responsibility to instruct their children. This is particularly true concerning instruction in regard to sex, and children are too often left to find for themselves
