The Judge granted an order for a mandamus nisi, remarking that he would like to see the question disposed of before the full court whether a doctor advertising was guilty of scandalous professional conduct.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

New Baiting Regulation

HALIFAX, June 20.
United States Consul-General Frye, today received a cable despatch from Consul Mallory of St. John's, Newfoundland, announcing a change of policy in regard to licenses for bait. Hitherto all Canadian and American vessels were taxed one dollar per ton every time they visited Newfoundland for bait, besides the cost of the bait. The new regulation provides that licenses shall be issued at one dollar per barrel for bait, and no vessel is to exceed 40 barrels at a baiting.

The McLeod Poisoning Case.

PICTOU, June 20.
The McLeod poisoning case came to an end to-day, and the prisoner, who was charged with having mixed oxalic acid in his wife's tea, left the court, as Judge Meagher expressed it, without a stain upon his character. The Crown Prosecutor said he had no evidence to present to the jury, and they immediately returned a verdict of "Not Guilty." Judge Meagher in severe tones censured W. F. Best, analytical chemist, of St. John. The Judge said his ignorance upon subjects which, as an expert, he should know, was deplorable.

New Chief of Police.

LONDON, June 20.
Right Hon. Henry Mathews, Home Secretary, announced to the House of Commons to-day, that Col. Sir Edward Ridley Colbourne Bradford, Political Under Secretary for the India office, had been appointed to succeed Monroe as Chief of the Metropolitan Police Force. Radicals denounced the appointment as a bad job, as he is a friend of the Prince of Wales.

Another Strike.

BOSTON, June 20.
All the building laborers employed by Norcross Brothers were ordered to stop work again to-day, because the firm were employing non-union men. Several more contractors have granted the increase asked by the laborers. The Strike Committee report no union man working for less than twenty-five cents an hour. Some three hundred laborers are on strike in Cambridge.

QUEBEC, June 20.
Mr. Dumas, who was defeated at Lake St. John yesterday, adds another to the list of defunct National Conservatives. His successful opponent, Marcotte, is a Liberal, but a supporter of Mercier.
