Stars Edge Dodgers 5-4 On MacKinnon's Bunt

Earl MacKinnon laid down a squeeze bunt in the last half of the eighth inning to score speedy Bill Purcell from third and give the Stars a close 5-4 win over the Dodgers in a thrilling game at Memorial Field last night.

The Stars built up a 3-0 lead in the first three innings, scoring a long rally in each frame, but the fighting Dodgers started a three-run uprising in the fifth inning and chased starter Vern Handrahan, who was replaced by Donnie MacDonald. MacDonald only pitched to one batter before giving way to MacKinnon, who pitched two-hit ball in the last four frames to pick up the win.

The Stars got another counter in the sixth but the Dodgers tied it up again in the seventh as Irv MacKinnon clubbed a double, advanced to third on a wild pitch and scored on an infield out. The Dodgers could only manage four hits off the Stars' hurlers, but the winners made four errors and two of them were very costly.

Chicago White Sox Take League Lead By Shading New York Yanks Yesterday 3-2

Chicago nosed ahead by two percentage points in the five-team American Baseball League scramble Thursday, knocking New York Yankees out of the lead with a 3-2 victory.

Billy Pierce, the White Sox' stylish lefty, came in to nail it down when a Yankee rally in the ninth uprooted Connie Johnson, recently promoted from Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League. Pierce struck out Jerry Coleman, batting for Joe Collins, with the bases loaded to end the game.

Until the ninth Johnson had a 3-0 shutout over loser Bob Turley. A two-run homer by Walt Dropo, his 14th of the season, gave the Sox their victory edge in the third. Jim Rivera's single knocked in the first run in the first inning.

After Mickey Mantle's safe homer with a man on had ruined Johnson's shutout bid in the ninth, Bill Skowron was safe on a fumbled grounder by Bobby Adams. Manager Marty Marion decided to bring in Pierce who walked two, one intentionally before snuffing out the threat.

Chicago's victory tightened the race all the way down through fifth place, where Detroit Tigers, 7.5 winners over Baltimore, are only 5 1/2 games from the top. Cleveland moved within one game of first by whipping Boston 6-4, the Red Sox remaining three games behind.

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Durelle Retains Title Roy & Trainor Both Win

MONCTON (CP)—Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., successfully defended his Canadian light heavyweight title Thursday when he flattened Billy Fifield of Toronto in one minute, 10 seconds of the first round of a scheduled 12-rounder.

Durelle, who at 171 carried a one-pound weight advantage, hung a vicious right cross on Fifield's face and the challenger went down for the full count.

In retaining his title, Durelle didn't even work up a sweat. Fifield, apparently intent on a quick kill, came storming across the ring with the opening bell. He hit Durelle with a solid left then hastily back-pedaled as Durelle hammered him with counter lefts.

NO SECOND CHANCE Durelle didn't give Fifield a second chance but swarmed all over him, setting the stage for his thundering right. Fifield barely stirred at the count of 10.

The end came so suddenly most of the 3,500 fans didn't realize it was over.
