Second Gift To Tignish Church

TIGNISH — Two year ago Rev. M. J. The present rail, which now measures forty-eight feet in length, has three openings for exits of three feet each in width. Steel Strike In Third Week

HAMILTON (CP) — The Steel Company of Canada strike enters its third week today as both company and union remain unyielding on their stand on the key issues. Company-union talks resumed Monday in the Comaught Hotel for the sixth time since the 7,500 members of Local 1005 of the United Steel Works of America (CLC) walked off the job at Canada's largest steel producer. Direct intervention by Ontario Labor Minister Daley appeared Monday to be the only key to end the stalemate on the strike of many issues.
