There was a fine attendance at the service at the West Devon United Church on Sunday afternoon April first when the Easter Communion was given. The minister, Rev. W. G. Dickson presided assisted by Elders Charles Moreshead and James T. Wood. Memorial flowers were placed on the Communion Table in memory of M's. William Cullen by the family.

Saturday night, March 31st was a memorable one for the village of O'Leary as once again the village was lit by street lights. On February 16th, 1949 a fire completely destroyed the Fred Champion Electrical Plant in O'Leary with an estimated loss of \$60,000. The plant supplied electricity to the village of O'Leary and the neighboring community of Knutsford. Mr. Champion supplied splendid street lighting service at a cost of twenty-five cents a month from each subscriber. After the fire, the government came to the aid of the village and for a number of months a fine service was supplied by a Citizens Committee. When the Maritime Electric Co. of Charlottetown took over the service and supplied current to the village of O'Leary, Unionvale and Knutsford there was no agreement regarding the street lights. So during the slippery days of winter and the muddy days of spring, the residents groped their way about the darkened streets as best they could by aid of flashlights. Mention must be made of the fine service of Mr. Harold Jelly of Jelly's Dept. Store in keeping his large brightly lit Neon sign on all night. This was a great help to those who had to use the streets at night. Other merchants and business houses who had Neon Signs and left them on for quite a while were the Rexall Drug Store and the Farmers Co-Op. The new lights will cost the subscribers six dollars a year or fifty cents a month. Nobody will be forced to pay this, but nearly every subscriber in a recent survey conducted by representative citizens, indicated their willingness to pay the amount. The lights throughout the main business section are on every other pole. A number are placed on the streets leading to Swifts Buttery and other streets.

There are eleven public spirited citizens who are guaranteeing the price of the street lights to the Company. They will collect from the people. There are twenty-five lights, each with a hundred watt bulb. Fifteen of the lights are on the main street and the other ten scattered along the other streets. It is confidently hoped that the residents will continue to back up the eleven members who have guaranteed the money to the Company. So now the thriving village of O'Leary, one of the finest business districts in the province is now well lighted.

Former neighbors will be interested to know that Mr. Harold Toombs, formerly of Breadalbane, now of Toronto, Ontario, has been appointed foreman of the Maintenance Department of the King Edward Hotel, one of the largest hotels in Toronto. Congratulations are extended to Mr. Toombs.

By suitable readings, one on each word of the threefold theme, Mrs. Lorne Seaman, Mrs. Kenneth Doull and Mrs. Lawrence Newson impressed upon the congregation the importance of remembering the death of Christ, rejoicing over His triumphant resurrection, and resolving to go forward with renewed energy in the Christian work. Three special musical numbers were rendered: a duet, "On Calvary's Brow," by Mrs. Angus Gillis and Mr. Hedley Woodside; a hymn, "At The Cross," by the Junior choir, and a hymn, "Glory To His Name," by the entire choir. Mrs. Alex MacDonald read the twenty-eighth chapter of Matthew and Mrs. Hugh MacKay led in prayer. Other hymns sung were "Christ The Lord Is Risen," "Never Further Than Thy Cross," "Jesus Keep Me Near The Cross," and "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross." Mrs. J. J. 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
