Conditions in the Sulu Islands.

We have insisted, it appears, upon the
cession of the Sulu Islands in addition
to the group properly known as the Philip-
pines, and Spain has agreed. Technically
no doubt, we are entitled to make the de-
mand, and it was one about which no great
reluctance was to be apprehended on the
part of Spain. She had formally included
them by proclamation in the adjoining group
years ago, and although neither geography
nor convenience endorsed the step, it was
no hardship to compel her to abide by her
own action. She could also well afford it
unless she intended to sell the islands to
somebody else, for to her at least they were
absolutely useless. No islands in all the
oceans have so bad a name as the Sulu
group. Occupied by savage tribes, and
the chief haunt of the very worst class
of pirates produced even by the eastern
archipelago, they have long been a menace
to shipping and a regular cruising ground
for British men-of-war engaged in the
protection of commerce. That duty will no
doubt now devolve upon our own war ships
on the Philippine station, which are likely
to find their duties no sinecure for a good
while to come. After all it was perhaps
well that if we were to become owners of a
Philippine empire we should add the Sulus
to our new possessions. Financially, and it
may be otherwise also, we shall prob-
ably have cause to regret our policy, but it
may be some satisfaction to know that our
nearest neighbors will be the British in
Borneo.—Harper's Weekly.

Traders Killed and Eaten

ANTWERP, Dec. 14.—The steamer Leo-

from Africa with Congo advices, reports
that four Belgian traders have been killed
and eaten by the natives of Upper Ubanghi.
A punitive force, it is also said, has been
despatched to that district.

Distinguished Services.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—To carry out the
suggestion contained in his annual report
relative to curing the defects of the present
laws governing rewards for distinguished
services and promotions in the navy,
Secretary Long yesterday sent to Congress
the drafts of two bills on the subject.
These have been prepared with great care
by Judge Advocate General Lemley and it
is generally believed provide for the proper
recognition of acts of extraordinary brave-
ry without involving the virtual punish-
ment of officers who have honorably and
faithfully done their full duty.

The first bill provides for the bestowal
of three classes of medals for distinguished
services; an "Honor" medal for distin-
guished conduct in battle, carrying with
it an increase of pay ranging from 5 to 15
per cent; a "Courage" medal for extra-
ordinary heroism and a "service" meda
for distinguished public service in time
of war.

The second bill provides that the ad-
vancement in grade of an officer for ser-
vice in the war with Spain shall not in-
terfere with the regular promotion of
other officers, but that the officer ad-
vanced shall not constitute an additional num-
ber in the grade to which he is promoted.

News Notes

The death of Surgeon-General Alexander
Smith, M. D., C. B., honorary physician
to the Queen, and Lieut of the Army Medi-
cal Corps, occurred with great suddenness
on Friday last the deceased officer had
a brilliant career. He was present at the
siege of Sebastopol, and received the
medal with clasp and the Turkish medal.
He was promoted to surgeon-major in
1869, and was present with the expedi-
tion against the Jowaki Afridis. He also
served through the Afghan war as principal
medical officer. He was frequently
mentioned in despatches, and was awarded
a C. B. In 1881 he became inspector-
general, and retired three years later.

Murder Will Out

St. SCH LASTIQUE, Dec 14 --There was
a decided sensation yesterday morning in
the trial of Cordelia Vias, who is, in com-
pany with Samuel Parslow, charged with
the murder of her husband, Isadore Poirie
o St. Canute, Q. C., on November 27th
1897. The crown called Sheriff Lapoint
to the witness box and asked him to relate
confession made to him by the prisoner.
The Sheriff refused, as the confession had
been made on a promise of secrecy, but
the judge over-ruled the objection, and
the related that a couple of months after the
first trial of the prisoner, he was talking
about the case with her when she referred
to some evidence regarding foot-prints on
the floor of the room in which the murder
was committed, which she said could not
have been hers, as she was wearing rub-
bers that day and only took them off in the
evening.

"So you were there," said the Sheriff
carelessly, and the prisoner replied, "If you
will keep it a secret I will tell everything."
The sheriff promised, and the prisoner
then detailed the whole story of the mur-
der to him, saying that Parslow had
struck the first blow. During the recital
of the sheriff's evidence the prisoner wept
copiously.
