### Truckers Get Shorter Haul From Building Site

By RON CAMERON Guardian-Patriot Staff Writer A speeding up of the excavation work at the new Memorial Building site, plus a higher return for truckmen employed, is seen in a temporary change of the dumping site from the North River Co-operative housing project area to the Spring Park playground district. The truckers working on the job will have a shorter haul, about one mile and three tenths compared to two miles and one tenth, and they will be paid on a load basis. When the site for dumping was changed, the truckers working for Pigott Construction Co. approached R.M. Rickard, general superintendent of construction, asking for the load rate. They had previously been paid by the hour, with a minimum number of two trips per hour.

### Seven Escape Flames At St. Peters

Seven people, including five children, were left homeless yesterday morning when fire raced through a small, frame dwelling at St. Peter's Bay. The fire, which broke out shortly after seven o'clock, quickly razed the home of Mr. and Mrs. William MacGilligan, and their children, Kevin, 12; Tommy, 10; Sarah, 8; Bernadette, 3; and Debbie, 1. The children were in bed when the fire broke out, possibly from an overheated stove, but all were removed without injury, and were given shelter at the home of a neighbor. The Red Cross Disaster Services unit was contacted and was providing emergency relief for the stricken family.
