MacNaught Sees Liberal Majority

ALBERTON — "There is now no doubt whatsoever that the people of Canada will give the Pearson government a majority on Nov. 8," the Hon. J. Watson MacNaught, Minister of Mines and Technical Surveys, told an audience of about 150 in Alberton last night.

"Various recent surveys, some of them independent, predicted at least 140 seats for the Liberal party," Mr. MacNaught stated, during the course of a review of the Liberal record during the last two and a half years.

Referring to Mr. Pearson as "a strong man who gives strong leadership," Mr. MacNaught said, since 1900, Prime ministers have talked about a Canadian flag but it took Mike Pearson to obtain a distinctive Canadian flag.

The student loan fund, a proposed scholarship plan and the Canada pension plan were also described in detail.

ISLANDER'S DREAM
"For over 100 years Islanders have dreamed of a tunnel or causeway to the mainland," Mr. MacNaught said. "Tomorrow in Bayfield, New Brunswick, at 2.30 will have the pleasant task of turning the first sod to start construction of the multi-million-dollar Northumberland Strait crossing and it will be a momentous occasion for Prince Edward Island."

Others who spoke in support of Mr. MacNaught's re-election were Prosper Arsenault, Robert Campbell and Alec Campbell, members of the provincial legislature, and Lester Wallace of Cascumpec, past president of the West Prince Liberal Association.

Chairman of the meeting was Andrew Wells.

Warren Burns of the Experimental Farm said yesterday that Tuesday night's fall appears to be the earliest on record since 1931 when snow fell in the month of October.

Committee To Examine Welfare Bureau Needs

A unique event in the annals of social welfare in Charlottetown took place Tuesday evening when the board of directors of the Catholic and Protestant Family Welfare bureaus came together for a joint meeting to discuss some of their mutual plans and problems.

The meeting which was held in the Catholic Social Welfare Building had as its co-chairmen William Murphy and Ralph Rupert, presidents respectively of the Catholic and Protestant bureaus.

The members discussed many facets of their work as well as current trends in social welfare services including the proposed Canada Assistance Plan which is expected to bring some radical changes and improvements in the administration and distribution of welfare benefits.

Deep concern was expressed on the inadequacy of funds provided by governing bodies and charitable sources and fears were voiced that the bureaus might very soon be forced to turn away many persons in need.

The bureaus receive much of their support from the United Fund and it was noted that the objective had not yet been reached in the current campaign. The hopes were expressed that in view of the great need, the citizens of the province would make every effort to enable the Appeal to obtain the funds on which so many agencies including the bureaus must largely depend.

Resulting from the meeting was a decision to form a joint committee to study the bureaus' collective needs and recommend ways and means to meet them.

From their wealth of training and experience, the executive directors of the bureaus, Sister Mary Henry and Miss Elizabeth Torrey, offered much helpful advice and information to the meeting and agreed to act on the joint committee aforementioned.

The meeting was considered such a success that it was agreed that the bureaus would continue to meet periodically in similar sessions.

School Area Has Project

SUMMERSIDE — The chairman of Kensington Regional High School, Austin Pendergast, announced last night that the Kensington regional area has applied for a grant for a Centennial project commemorating the 1967 Centennial celebrations.

The project, supported by 27 of the 30 areas, is a sports field which is expected to, when completed, cost in the vicinity of \$14,000.

The project was begun in the late fall of 1963 but came to a standstill as a result of lack of funds. The field complex which already has what has been termed one of the best tracks on the island will also consist of a paved tennis court, removable outdoor rink, and two ball diamonds.

Mr. Pendergast said "we're very happy with the response for this project" which will be recognized as the Kensington Regional Centennial Sports Field didn't support the project, two of them had sought projects of their own prior to being approached on this project.

Five Plead Not Guilty To Road Act Offence

SUMMERSIDE — Five youths, Carl Connick, Spring Valley; William Tuplin and Lowell Bearliso, Kensington; Paul Harding, Darnley, and Lorne Cousins, Baltic, entered pleas of not guilty before Justice of the Peace Leo Blaquiere in Prince County Court yesterday morning to a charge that they "did unlawfully leave upon or in view of a street, dirt, filth or rubbish which was offensive to the general appearance of the street, contrary to section 42, subsection 3 of the P.E.I. Roads Act."

The charges arose from an incident Halloween night in the Town of Kensington.

The cases were adjourned to Nov. 10 for a trial date to be set. G. Bruce MacDonald represented the five accused.

No pleas were taken in the cases of three Summerside youths, James Kevin Coffin, Gerald Wendell McNally and Anthony Jose Richard, charged with moving a highway traffic sign at Kelvin Grove. Their cases were also adjourned to Nov. 10.

Ernest Brenton Rogers of Chelton was fined \$50 and costs for driving while his license was suspended.

An RCAF man, Paul Fenton McCloskey, was fined \$25 and costs for failing to surrender a driver's license which was suspended. On a similar charge Joseph Terrence Arsenault of Summerside was also fined \$25 and costs.

Joseph Lloyd DesRoches of Central Bedouque, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of crossing a solid white line and his case was adjourned to Nov. 10.

Lloyd David MacKinnon of Misouche was fined \$25 and costs for making false application for a driving license when his license was suspended for three years.

Speaker Accuses Liberals Of Playing Arrogant Politics

"As each day passes this election campaign resembles more and more the campaign of 1958 when people turned out in enthusiastic numbers with solid opinions about the administration of the nation," Mrs. Jean Wadds told a capacity audience at the Victoria village hall last night.

Speaking on behalf of Queens county Progressive Conservative candidates, Heath MacQuarrie and Angus MacLean, the former Conservative member in the Ontario riding of Grenville-Dundas blasted the liberals for playing cheap politics in suggesting that only one party in the election contest is interested in national unity, peace, prosperity and that only that party has any hope of forming a majority government.

"It is a pleasure to share a platform with people who say what they mean and mean what they say, after my disillusionment with the government in the last parliament."

"There were ministers in the last cabinet who were not doing a proper job. Many of these men should have been asked by the Prime Minister to find other jobs for themselves but they were not. A Prime Minister who cannot discipline his party in the house is not worthy of administering the nation. It is time for something better for Canada."

"Never have I entered an election with more confidence than I have now," Heath MacQuarrie told his hometown audience. "I am confident of victory and I am confident in the Progressive Conservative cause. I am confident that the values we are trying to put forth are for the good of the nation, its government, its people and its prosperity."

"I believe that those who live in this Atlantic community are entitled to the benefits of opportunity and security which shall be no less than all Canadians have the right to enjoy," J. Angus MacLean added. "I recognize that while much has been done as the result of Conservative policies, we of the Atlantic provinces must face the fact that our special problems are not solved and are worthy of continuing review, and readjustment."

Premier Walter Shaw blasted the "Liberal organizers of the causeway official ceremonies to be held Friday night in P.E.I. but in New Brunswick. Not one local representative of the people of this province was invited to attend this ceremony. The causeway will never be a memorial to Watson MacNaught as has been suggested, but will rather be a tombstone to his political life."

The meeting was conducted by Keith Boswell.

Freight Damage Concerns Board

SUMMERSIDE — A committee was empowered last night at a regular monthly Board of Trade meeting here to make arrangements to determine the costs for construction of a tourist bureau on the board's picnic site at Wilmot and to meet with the town to discuss financing for this project.

The board has been sponsoring a tourist bureau at Read's Corner but the need for a new establishment has been realized by the board.

A suggestion that drafting students at Prince County Vocational High School submit designs for this building was favorably received by board members and it was suggested that this be in the form of a contest with the winning student being awarded a prize.

These designs would in turn be submitted to an architect.

Considerable concern was shown by board members over the amount of merchandise being transported here via CNR being damaged en route to the province. A number of board members reported having received damaged merchandise and expressed dissatisfaction with the service.

In expressing his opinion, one member stated the CNR's service has deteriorated since trucks were put into service for transporting merchandise to the province.

Other matters discussed included the industrial park situation, highway safety, downtown parking and Christmas store hours.

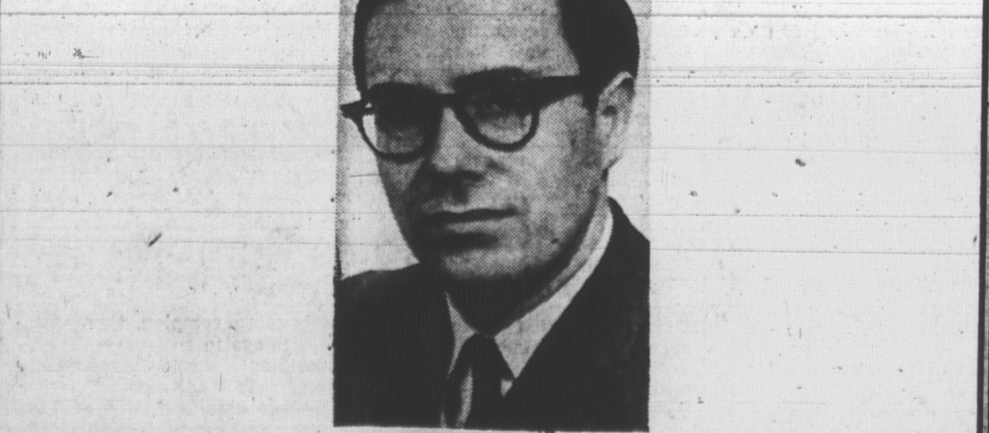
