

DRIVER ESCAPES, PASSENGER INJURED

Two Airmen Injured When Car Leaves Unpaved Road

Two airmen from R.C.A.F. Station Summerside were taken to Prince County Hospital, and one, in critical condition, was transferred by aircraft to Halifax last evening, following a highway accident which occurred shortly before midnight on Tuesday, when the 1951 Dodge coach in which they were travelling left the road at a point on the clay highway west of Stanley Bridge.

The car, travelling east towards Cavendish, is believed to have overturned several times, completely demolishing the vehicle and throwing both men from the debris. The two injured airmen were taken to hospital in Summerside by ambulance after Dr L.K. Zielinski of Kensington had attended their injuries at the scene of the accident.

Lac. Donald C. Jerrett of Carleton Place, Newfoundland, most seriously injured of the two, was still unconscious last evening when transferred by air to Halifax, suffering from injuries which included brain concussion, fractured jaw, and badly bruised left leg. His condition was described as serious.

Lac. Arnold B. MacDonald, of Souris, driver of the car, miraculously escaped with bruises and abrasions on the left leg and back, and shock.

The accident was first observed by Mr. and Mrs. Reagh R. Douglas who were returning to their nearby home in a half-ton truck.

The damage which resulted to the car was most extensive, as it is probable that because they were thrown from the wreckage both occupants escaped from being crushed or torn to pieces.

The police investigation of the accident was conducted by members of the R.C.M.P. from the Summerside and Charlottetown detachments.

Survey Of Alberton Harbour Announced By Dr. Phillips

At the official opening of the Alberton Aquatic Sports meet Dr Orville Phillips, M.P., said that he had received notice from Dr Mark Boyer of the Department of Survey that an immediate survey of Alberton Harbor will be carried out.

Dr. Phillips afterwards in an interview said that this was a project in which both he and the Board of Trade were deeply interested. He said that in former years Alberton had been a great shipping centre and a survey will indicate if it will be necessary to dredge the harbor. Dr. Phillips pointed out that, although such a dredging project was something to be considered for the future, that as a result of such work Alberton could one day regain its status as an important Island shipping point.

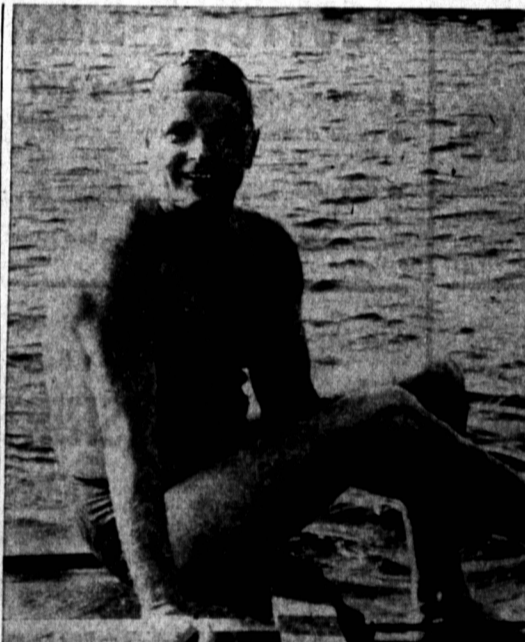
