Yankees Defeat Athletics 7-2 To Take First Place; Tigers Snap Losing Streak

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 10.—New York Yankees defeated Philadelphia Athletics 7-2 here today before the second largest crowd of the season 23,034, with Joe DiMaggio and Bill Dickey each belting a homer. Yankees went into first place. Johnny Murphy, making his first start for the Yankees, failed to go the route. He gave only four hits in the 7-3 innings he worked but he passed seven and had to be relieved by Pat Malone.

The Yankees took advantage of George Turbeville's wildness, missing opportune base hits with passing and a hit batsman to roll up their run total.

Lefly Grove got a taste of his own medicine as Washington playing at home, knocked him off the mound, ended his five game winning streak and shut out Boston 1-0. About 25,000 fans saw the Red Sox pushed out of first place in the American League.

Grove, who pitched three shutouts in winning his five games, was banged heavily from the start. The Senators nicked him for seven hits and four runs in 3 1-3 innings.

Buck Newsom was in rare form

winning his fourth game and allowed but six singles.

Cleveland Indians scored twice in the 18th inning on a walk, a triple and a single, to break up the longest game played at Detroit this season and 1-0 9-7 over Detroit Tigers.

The Tribe's outburst spoiled a fine stretch of relief pitching by Joe Sullivan. Stepping to the mound with one out in the second after Elden Auker had given up six hits and five runs, Sullivan thrilled a Sunday crowd of 33,000 by limiting the Indians to two runs in the next 12 innings.

They edged back into the first division Saturday 4-3 at the expense of Cleveland Indians as the American League champions opened a long home stay at Navin Field before 21,000.

Boston Red Sox pounded a 9-5 win over the Senators at Washington, with Rube Walberg taking his first victory over the Yankees.

The Yankees won a 5-2 victory over Philadelphia Athletics at New York.

Rogers Hornsby's Browns outthrew Chicago White Sox 11-7 but lost 7-3 at St. Louis.

Celtics Defeat Abbies To Win Hoop Title

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, May 10.—Halifax Celtics won the Maritime senior girls' basketball championship, played under boys' rules, by defeating Charlottetown Abbey Sisters in a sudden-death game here Saturday night, 36-28.

First Period

On the tip-off from centre, the ball was passed up the floor to Margaret Dobson, fast-shooting Halifax forward, who was fouled on while about ready to get a shot away. Margaret made good on the foul shot, and opened the scoring of the game. For the only time in the title, the Abbies put the score ahead of the Celtics, when Jean Grant registered the first field goal of the contest. Margaret Dobson retaliated by a nice score after dribbling through the "Abbies" defence. Kay Fleming, rangy Celtic jumping-centre, continued to take the tip from E. Her Rattenbury, the 11-year-old school teacher from Charlottetown. Virginia Harrington then put in one of her longshots, for which she is well-known, to raise the score for the Celtics. Both teams scored on foul shots. The foul shooting was exceptionally good throughout the game. When Halifax called time out the score stood 8-4 in favor of the Celtics. Until the end of the first half, Charlottetown attempted to play a defensive game and kept their five players up the floor. As a result, when their guards captured the ball, their forwards did not get down fast enough to capitalize.

Paul Brand and Irene Turner turned on the pressure during this part of the game and between them scored eleven points. Irene Turner was exceptional at this time. At the end of the first half, the Halifax girls led the Charlottetown girls 19-9.

Second Period

The "Abbey Sisters" came back in the second period, a different appearing team and out scored their opponents 22-17 but they could not manage to make up their thirteen point deficit from the first half. Frances Ayers was the Charlottetown heroine during the period, scoring; beautifully from all angles. Frances opened the scoring in the second half with a fine long side shot. Much amusement was caused at this time when one of the Abbies, slightly confused, dribbled beautifully down through her own forward line and took a shot at the Abbies basket. Jean Grant and E. Her Rattenbury then added three points for the Island squad. The Halifax girls then made up this five point advantage by getting five points themselves. Margaret Dobson making two baskets in quick succession and Irene Turner scoring from the foul line. At this time, Betty Brand, Halifax guard, was banished for fouls and from then on the Celtics were a weakened team. The Charlottetown girls controlled the play from this time on with beautiful long shots by Anne Sherry and Frances Ayers. Most of the Charlottetown scores were made on long shots. The score when the final whistle blew stood 36-28. The game was fast throughout and one that was pleasing to watch. Practically all the players on the floor were outstanding and each one contributed in full to the high-class playing exhibited on the "C" floor. Margaret Dobson was high-scoring of the game, with fifteen points to her credit. Anne Sherry of Charlottetown and Irene Turner of Halifax followed, each having scored nine points.

Cardinals Strengthen Lead With Double Win Over Cubs

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. LOUIS, May 10.—St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Cubs 5-1 today in a five-inning game. Chicago curtailed by rain, and more firmly entrenched themselves in first place.

Avenge a defeat in the season's opening series, Paul Dean held the Cubs to three hits while his former teammate, Tex Carleton, was roughly handled for seven.

After Woody English singled with one out in the second, the younger of the Deans retired the remaining 11 Cubs in order, fanning two. Paul Derringer, hurling his first game since suspension for failing to slide home in a game against the Giants, held the Pirates to three scattered hits at Pittsburgh to give Cincinnati Reds a 6-0 victory.

Babe Herman had a perfect day at the plate, poundin' out a home run, double and two singles. Billy Myers, also of the Reds, hit for the circuit in the seventh with two mates on base.

Derringer fanned five and allowed but one Pirate to reach third base.

Hal Schumacher was nicked for 10 hits and two runs by the Phillies at home, but his mates slapped Bowman and Tom Zachary for six runs in the first two innings to give New York Giants a 6-2 victory before 12,000 fans.

Terry Leiber, Schumacher and Jackson of the Giants' 12 hit assault with two each, while Johnny Moore of the Phillies had a perfect day with four hits in four times at bat.

Bees climbed from the cellar to sixth place at Boston by defeating Brooklyn Dodgers 5-4 in 12 innings. The paid attendance was 7,700.

The winning run crossed the plate with one out when Wally Berger scratched a single to Stripp, went to second base on the latter's high throw to first, and scored on Tony Cuccinello's single.

(C.F. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, May 10.—Coach William J. (Bill) Hancock of Oshawa believes Canadian hockey might as well make up its mind that United States and England will continue to take young players from this country and that Canada had better get busy in developing young players.

Addressing a banquet in honor of the Oshawa Oshas, O. M. A. Intermediate "A" champions, here last night, he said legislation passed by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to change the definition of an amateur would not stop migration of players to other countries.

As long as United States and British rink owners held out lucrative positions, Canadian players would continue to leave this country to better themselves and play hockey.

Cooperation with other hockey federations who need Canadian hockey players, instead of continually bickering them, was the answer to the migration problem, Mr. Hancock said, "because in the United States and England and in other countries huge sums were invested in hockey rinks and Canadian players are needed in order to make them a paying proposition."

"We must not only be the breeding ground of hockey players but also the nursery," he declared.

Qualifying Field Ready For Open Golf

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 10.—The business of eliminating golfers who think they are good enough to qualify for the United States open championship from those who are good enough will be carried on tomorrow on 28 courses all over the country.

Exactly 1,245 players, the largest field in history, will compete for 137 places, and those who remain will join the 33 exempt players in the final struggle over the Baltusrol, N. J., Golf Club, June 4-6.

It is generally the case in these 36-hole sectional qualifiers that a number of youngsters with big hopes and nothing to lose scramble into the championship proper at the expense of some who are given a chance to win the title. And there are probably as many fine golfers outside the exempt list as there are inside.

Among those who must qualify are Lawson Little, former British and United States amateur champion and now a professional, Tommy Armour, 1927 open king, Johnny Revolta, the Professional Golfers Association champion and Willie MacFarlane, winner of the title 11 years ago.

Others who must take the test are Leo Diegel, Joe Kirkwood, Ralph Guldahl, Jimmy Hines, Willy Cox, Bill Mehlhorn, Byron Nelson, Willie Klein, Mike Brady and George Vogt.

Campbell, two members of the Walker Cup team, Campbell twice held the Canadian amateur title.

Omaha Wins First Race On British Turf

Starr Pitches Syracuse To Double Win

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, May 10.—Baltimore Orioles brought an abrupt end to Montreal Royals' winning ways here today, defeating the International League leaders in both ends of a doubleheader, 7-1 and 5-5. A near-record crowd of 21,000 jammed the Stadium.

After winning the first game easily behind three-hit pitching of Fred "Sheriff" Blake, Baltimore came from behind in the nightcap to wipe out a 3-0 lead Royals took in the first inning.

In the most magnificent pitching performance ever recorded in International League history at Syracuse, Starr pitched the Orioles to a double victory over Toronto Maple Leafs. Both games were shutouts, both games were two-hit games, and three of the four scattered singles off the Syracuse "iron man" in 16 innings were of the scratch variety.

Only one Toronto player reached third base in the first game, and one got as far as second in the seven-inning nightcap as the Chiefs won by 9-0 and 3-0. Beginning in the fourth frame of the first game and continuing through the third inning of the afterpiece, Starr pitched nine consecutive hitless innings.

Canadian teams again took the spotlight Saturday. Royals downed Baltimore for the third straight time behind Leon Chagnon's steady pitching, 3-1, while Toronto defeated Syracuse 5-3 in an eight-inning second game that was called to permit Syracuse to catch a train. Four Syracuse errors gave Toronto three unearned runs in the first game.

The Redwings defeated Newark Bears at Rochester 6-3 for a second straight win. Two homers by Koy and one by Chandler accounted for Newark's runs.

The Elson's, at home, went on a prolonged spree of extra base slugging to defeat Albany 20-8. It was Albany's 13th straight defeat. The Elsons drove 11 of their 22 hits for extra bases.

Canzoneri To Meet Ambers Before Tackling Ross; McLarnin Likely To Retire

NEW YORK, May 10.—While all the fight world buzzed with echoes of his spectacular defeat of Canadian Jimmy McLarnin Friday night, little Tony Canzoneri, the lightweight champion, trained his sights on still bigger game today.

Nursing a badly cut nose in midtown hide-away, one of the greatest little battlers of all-time flung a challenge toward Chicago and the camp of Barney Ross, the welterweight king.

"First I want to get Lou Ambers out of the way," he said. "Then I'll be ready for Ross. I'll give McLarnin another bout, too, if he wants it."

Except for his damaged nose Tony came out of the bruising bout with the Vancouver boxer in good shape but he plans to rest for six weeks before beginning training for Ambers. That makes it likely the lightweight title fight will not be held until July.

Tony and McLarnin each drew down \$22,658.12 as their share of the \$85,763.50 gross gate. The Garden danced a return match with Canzoneri in McLarnin's face, but failed to get a definite answer.

Personally, the game little Irishman would like another shot at Tony, but all talk of a return to the ring meets with determined opposition, both from Jimmy's pretty wife and manager Pop Foster.

Pop revealed that from the second round, when Tony dropped McLarnin to one knee, until the seventh, Jimmy hardly knew where he was.

"He was in a daze," Pop said. "He was fighting entirely by instinct. After the seventh, when we told him he'd have to win the next three rounds, he said, 'We're going into the third, aren't we?'"

Old timers agreed Friday night's exhibition was the greatest duel of little men in 25 years.
