Over, It's Fought

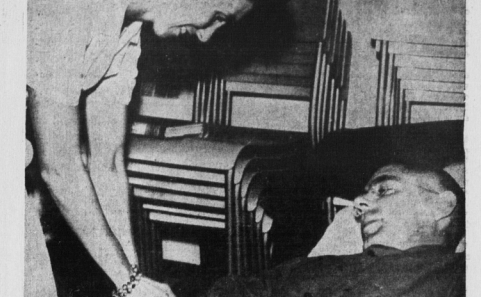
