Venus Probe May Succeed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The U.S. Mariner II space probe is expected to enter December rendezvous with the planet Venus Monday night after several anxious hours when project scientists feared the craft was too far off course to carry out its mission.

But officials announced today after exhaustive study of tracking data that the spacecraft is on a trajectory that can be corrected to make it fly by Venus within a distance of 10,000 miles as planned.

They reported that the 47-pound space voyager had been propelled only 250,000 miles off

More Religion In Schools, Urged by Synod Speakers

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Speakers at the general synod of the Anglican Church of Canada called Monday for more religion in public schools and more instruction in worthy affairs in church education.

The report noted that, mainly in Canada, religious education depends ultimately on the individual teacher.

The church will need to give as much time to the education of teachers as she does that of priests and other professional workers.

A day-long discussion of the basic and specific questions ranged through projects and proposals covering both the secular and religious fields.

School curriculums often contain materials which "to say the least do not do justice to the Christian view," the report said. The church should "maintain communication" with educational authorities during curriculum revision.

On possible future policy, the board suggested that establishments as other views," the board report said.

Religious education in the church must include study of the basic and specific questions about life that people are asking today, the kind of questions that are raised in newspapers, in a magazine, serious literature, motion and TV programs.

NEW YORK (AP) — America, Roman Catholic Jewish magazine, says some Jewish groups may produce an out-break of anti-Semitism in the United States if they continue to push for elimination of all religious practices in the public schools.

The weekly magazine, and an editorial in its Sept. 1 issue, says there have been "disturbing hints of heightened anti-semitic feeling" since the U.S. Supreme Court's decision banning a New York state official school prayer.

The editorial referred to the support given the decision by some Jewish groups and to the fact that Jews were among the signatories of the New York State case.

The magazine said it would be "most unfortunate if the entire Jewish community were to be blamed for the unrelenting insistence of a small but overly vocal segment within it."

The editorial was described by Joseph Chertoff, president of the American Jewish Congress, as containing "thinly veiled threats of anti-semitism."

Specifically, the schools should present a more accurate treatment of history; sympathetic treatment of Christian faith expressed in literature; an attitude of "reverent respect" toward the Bible; and an acknowledgment that factors other than material concerns should govern a pupil's choice of vocation.

Tropical Storm Develops At Sea

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The first tropical storm in the Atlantic this season boiled up Monday and gale warnings were raised from Morehead City to Cape Hatteras, N.C.

The storm, named Alma by forecasters, was about 100 miles east-southeast of Charleston, S.C. at 6 p.m. EDT.

Packing winds up to 45 miles an hour near the centre, the storm was moving north-north-east at about 14 miles an hour.

Winds of 20 to 40 miles an hour extend outward 200 miles from the centre, mostly in the eastern semi-circle.

MONTREAL (CP) — A man was arrested Monday after a bank hold-up in which the bank's accountant chased a suspect for a couple of blocks in a commandeered car.

Police said a lone gunman walked into a branch of the Bank of Montreal in northeast Montreal and forced a teller to hand over \$1,200. As he fled from the bank, accountant Andre Farreau ran after him.

Spotting the suspect running down the street, Mr. Farreau flagged down a passing station wagon, driven by Jacques Champagne, and started after the man.

He caught him minutes later and held him until police arrived.

Senator G. S. Thorvaldson of Winnipeg, who will retire in January after three years, as party president, said it would be a meeting at which both party organization and platform policy would be discussed in open session.

The meeting, drawing 1,500 delegates to Ottawa and perhaps as many more observers, is scheduled for Jan. 18 and 19. The Conservative party's national executive officers — representing the senior party group as well as women's youth
