## New Town Clerk Takes Up Post

**GEORGETOWN** — The Georgetown Town Council met in the council chambers on Monday night, with Mayor Howard S. MacLean presiding and Councilors Lavers, MacDonald, Currie, McConnell, MacLean and Johnson in attendance.

Mrs. Laura Murphy was sworn in by Mayor MacLean as Town Clerk. The former clerk, Mrs. Joan Easton, who resigned due to pressure of other work, is continuing for a time to assist the new clerk in familiarizing herself with the duties of office and until the completion of the audit now being conducted and the setting up of the new bookkeeping system.

Attending Monday's meeting was Claude Smith, Director of Town Planning for the Department of Municipal Affairs. Mr. Smith spoke to the Council on many aspects of Town Planning and answered many questions relating to this subject. His talk covered such subjects as subdivision planning; the size of lots in area on which may be located septic tanks; lot sizes where there is municipal sewer lines; building permits; trailer court regulations; building requirements and other related matters.

The Town of Georgetown and Georgetown Royalty came under Town Planning, after the town had made application and on a minute of the Executive Council dated September 22, 1964.

Correspondence was read relative to an application from Hazen Strangé to obtain a three-year lease on three commercial lots for the storage of pulp wood. The area involved was formerly used for this purpose and the council agreed to lease the lots for this purpose at \$150 per year.

Correspondence was read from the federal representative regarding the possibility of renting office space in the George-

town Federal Building for the use of a Royal Canadian Mounted Police Officer; if the town is successful in obtaining a contract for the RCMP to police the town.

The Council on motion decided that an application would be made to the Department of Municipal Affairs for the purpose of obtaining a loan for the installation of a municipal water and sewer system.

Also discussed was the question of the town administering a common well system to serve the six new homes being built on the west side of the town. Negotiations are currently being carried on regarding this matter, which would provide for the town administering the well and distributing system, at no cost to the town.

The question of the availability of living accommodations for a policeman, should the town enter into a contract for the services of a member of the RCMP was discussed and action is to be taken in this regard.

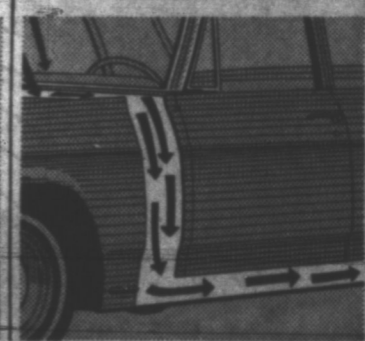
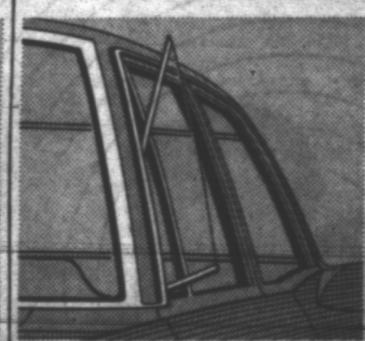
