Highway Conditions

The following notes on highway conditions in the Province at the present time have been issued by the Provincial Government:

Summerside-Tignish, 60 miles. Summerside to Montrose, 52 miles, paved. Montrose to Tignish, 8 miles, good gravel road.

Borden-Charlottetown, 43 miles. Borden to Ross Corner, 8 miles, paved. Turn right at Ross Corner through Freetown to Summerfield Church, 8 miles, good gravel road. At Summerfield turn right on pavement 25 miles to Charlottetown.

Borden-Summerside, 14 miles. Take paved highway No. 2 to Ross Corner, thence to Wilmot Bridge. This road is being repaired but is fair. An alternative route, while the road is under construction, is by marked detour from Ross Corner to Summerside.

Borden-Charlottetown, 40 miles, ten miles of which is under construction. Until work is completed, the best road from Borden to Charlottetown is Route 2 as described above.

Charlottetown-Montague, 30 miles, paved.

Charlottetown-Wood Islands, 39 miles. Charlottetown to Millview, 15 miles paved. Millview turn right on Route 4 and travel 10 miles on pavement to Eldon. Eldon to Wood Islands, 14 miles, good gravel road.

Montague-Wood Islands, 20 miles, good gravel road, 11 miles to Murray River, thence on Route 4A to High Bank, turn right and follow gravel road along shore, 9 miles—Murray River to Wood Islands. Charlottetown-Souris, 53 miles, paved.

Borden-Cavendish in the National Park, 28 miles. Take Route 2 to Ross Corner and detour to Summerfield Church, turn left and go 25 yards, then turn sharp right on to Graham's Road. Proceed 5 miles on gravel road to New London, turn sharp right and go through Stanley Bridge 10 miles on gravel road.

Borden to Brackley, Stanhope and Dalvey Beaches in National Park. Go to Charlottetown on Route 2. Charlottetown-Brackley, 14 miles, paved 4 miles to Charlottetown Airport on Route 15, then gravel road to Brackley, 10 miles. Charlottetown to Stanhope and Dalvey, Take Highway 6 to Bedford, 9 miles, turn left on pavement 4 miles, then 3 miles good gravel road to Dalvey. From Dalvey go along National Park shore road 4 miles to Stanhope Beach.

C.P.R. Earnings

MONTREAL, July 4 — (CP) — Canadian Pacific Railway reported net earnings for May at \$2,406,029 compared with \$664,105 in the corresponding period of 1949.

Gross earnings for May amounted to \$32,022,334 compared with \$30,471,803. Working expenses were \$29,616,305 compared with \$29,617,688.

Net earnings were \$3,708,225 for the first five months of this year, an increase of \$3,231,315 over the corresponding period of last year.
