

Chi-Sox Move To Top In A.L.; Giants Sweep 3-Game Series

Chicago White Sox slammed into first place in the American League Sunday with a doubleheader victory over Baltimore Orioles. Virgil Trucks fireballed a 3-2 victory in the opener and Ferris Fain climaxed a Sox comeback in the second game with a bases-loaded ninth-inning single that produced a 4-3 win.

The Sox record of seven wins in 11 games gave them a half-game edge over Washington and Detroit. The Tigers dropped out of first place when they lost 10-9 to Cleveland Sunday. Washington shelled Leo Kiely for five runs in the eighth inning to defeat Boston Red Sox 5-1 behind the seven-hit pitching of Chuck Stobbs.

New York Giants took a shutout sweep of a three-game National League series as Sal Maglie and Johnny Antonelli blanked Philadelphia 3-0 and 5-0 Sunday. The Phillies couldn't score for Robin Roberts Saturday nor for Curt Simmons and Murry Dickson in Sunday's doubleheader.

In a 1-0 tie in the National League doubleheader Sunday, Brooklyn whipped Pittsburgh 4-2 after losing 9-3 in the opener. The Cardinals collected a 7-6 victory over Milwaukee Braves in a 12-inning game at St. Louis.

YANKS, A's SPLIT

Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Redlegs split a doubleheader, the Cubs taking the first game 9-2 behind the six-hit pitching of Bubba Church and the Reds winning the second 3-2 on the four-hit hitting of rookie right-hander Art Fowler. Howie Pollet walked in the winning run of the nightcap.

In the American League, left-hander Morris Martin pitched Philadelphia Athletics to a 4-2 victory over New York Yankees in a doubleheader nightcap called after eight innings because of a Pennsylvania curfew law. The Yankees took the opener 6-1 on a homer barrage behind Jim McDonald.

A two-run homer in the 10th in-

ning by Cleveland outfielder Dave Philley, hitting .037, was the Tigers' downfall. It was a wild game which saw Detroit use six pitchers and Cleveland five—including its famed "Big Three" of Bob Lemon, Mike Garcia and Early Wynn.

The winning blow came off Dick Weik, Detroit's sixth pitcher. The winner was rookie Don Mossi, fourth hurler for the Indians.

PHILS FEEBLE
Maglie, 37 today, held the Phils to five singles and beat Simmons for his third straight in the opener. Then came the 24-year-old Antonelli to fog a three-hitter past the feeble Phils. All the hits were singles and nobody reached second base on the ex-Milwaukee bonus baby until the ninth. Monte Irvin and Hank Thompson helped him out with two-run homers.

Southpaw Johnny Podres held Pittsburgh to three hits for his win. He gave up only two extra-base blows—a triple by outfielder Jerry Lynch in the third which scored both of Pittsburgh's runs, and a double by Frank Thomas.

Thomas smashed a three-run homer in the first inning of the opener and added two singles. Curt Roberts doubled in the seventh with the bases loaded to highlight a five-run outburst. Vernon Law won the first game on 12 hits for his second victory and Don Newcombe, first of five Dodger pitchers, was charged with the loss.

The Cardinals won on an error, left fielder Jim Pendleton committing Milwaukee's second of the 12th inning by muffing a two-out fly ball.

PARNELL INJURED
Boston handed Washington a 6-1 beating in the American League Saturday but lost their ace left-hander Mel Parnell in the process. The pitcher suffered a fractured bone in his left forearm in the third inning and doctors said he would be out of action for several weeks.

Detroit nipped Cleveland 6-3 for their second win over the Indians

in as many days. Rookie right-hander Bob Trice pitched Philadelphia Athletics to a 1-0 victory over New York, the lone run resulting from Joe Demaestri's fifth-inning homer. Chicago White Sox spoiled Vern Bickford's American League debut by drubbing Baltimore 14-4.

In the National League, St. Louis topped Milwaukee 7-3 behind the six-hit pitching of Harvey Hadix. Marv Grissom hurled New York Giants to a 1-0 shutout over Philadelphia Phils with Whitey Lockman's home run the only score.

Carl Erskine brought about another shutout as Brooklyn whipped Pittsburgh 3-0. Cincinnati came from behind to nip Chicago Cubs 6-5 on Wally Post's three-run homer in the ninth.

Big Gus is a baseball pitcher and did some hurling last year in an Ontario League. When next hockey season rolls around Charlottetown will have at least half a team from its own residents. There's playing coach Bucko Trainor, Buck Whitlock, Lorne Hennessey, Jack Ready, Cecil Dowling, Gustavson and Ritchie. Junior MacLeod looked very good during post-League exhibition games and there is every possibility that he will make the grade with the team here next year. Orr Carver will be leaving for the New York Rangers training camp and a job in the Rangers chain while Forbes Kennedy will be back with Montreal Juniors as will Angie Carroll.

There are half a dozen other players who should stand a good chance of making the team but we can't comment on their ability because we haven't seen them play for one or two years. Eddy Kaye, Sterling MacLure and Sammy Green played well with the North Sydney Franklins in junior competition this year and may be about ready for senior competition. Ralph Shepherd has played around the Maritimes in senior hockey for the past two seasons. Willie Dunn of the Intermediate Abbies and Parkdale this past season and Big Art Perry who played with the Abbies should stick up well in senior play. For goalies there's Frank Roper and Thane Doyle both of whom have played plenty of hockey.

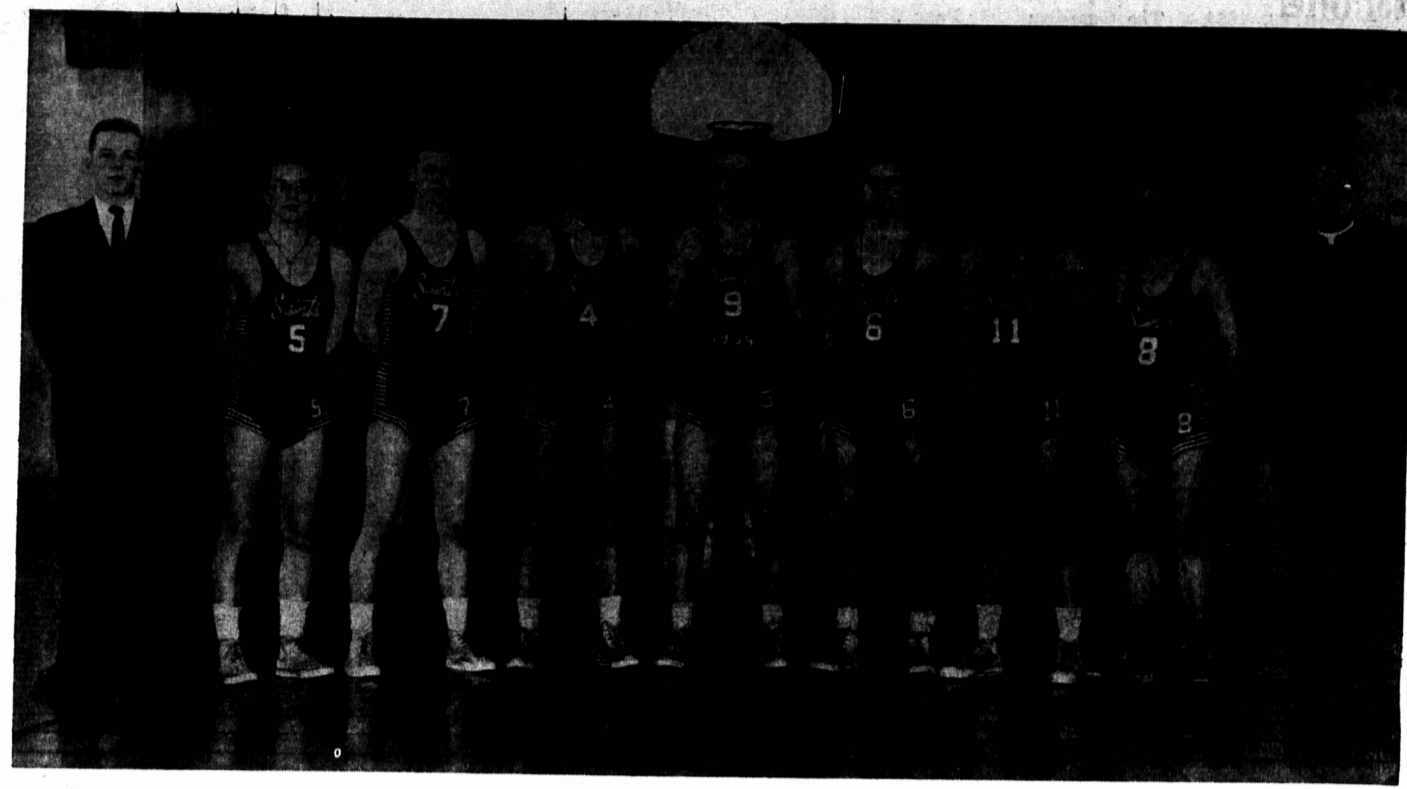

QUEBEC, (CP)—Ottawa Senators walloped Quebec Aces 6-3 Sunday before 6,119 fans to take a commanding 4-2 lead in the best-of-nine Quebec Hockey League final series.
