

Red China Jet Fighters Revenged On 3 Defectors

TAIPEI (AP) — Jet fighters from Communist China, gaining swift revenge, Sunday shot down an unarmed Nationalist Chinese seaplane carrying three Communist defectors to Formosa from Matsui.

Just hours before, the three, all sailors, had killed the skipper of a Communist Chinese landing craft and sailed the 25-ton vessel to the national-ist-held island of Matsui, a short distance from Communist-ruled mainland China. All six other members of the vessel's crew, four of them would-be refugees, also perished in the fight.

President Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government here had acclaimed the three as heroes and rushed a group of defence ministry officials to Matsui to bring them to Taipei. There was no attempt to maintain secrecy since the exploit was regarded here as a major propaganda triumph. Radio broadcasts, easily heard in Peking, told about it.

Obviously stung, the Communist Chinese sent Soviet-built MIGs aloft to intercept the Formosa-bound amphibian. It was shot down 15 minutes after leaving Matsui.

Chinese Nationalist warships and planes were searching the waters of the Formosa Strait for survivors but it was feared the three defectors, their escorting officers and the plane's crew were lost.

Communist China's defence minister, Lin Piao, issued an order in Peking commending his air force for bringing down the Nationalist plane. The Nationalist defence ministry, on the other hand, condemned the attack as "brutally unhumanitarian" and ordered its own air force to give the Communists "a bloody nose" in case of any similar incident.

The defence ministry here said the landing craft was carrying ammunition from the inland Min River port of Foochow to Kuantou, on the mainland 17 miles to the east, when the mutiny broke out.

Foochow, capital of Fukien province, is 150 miles across the Formosa Strait from Taipei.

The landing craft had sailed at midnight Saturday and during the night, said the ministry's account, seven of the crew mutinied.

Although four of them were slain in a pitched battle with the three die-hard Communists aboard, the three survivors managed to head the craft for Matsui 40 minutes after leaving Foochow.

IHC Records Are Reported

CHICAGO (AP) — International Harvester Company has reported record earnings, sales, capital expenditures and research and engineering expenditures for 1965.

Net income was \$106,574,000, or \$3.46 a share, compared with \$3.39 in 1964, the previous record year.

World sales totalled \$2,336,719,000, compared with \$2,211,452,000 in 1964.

Harry O. Bercher, president, said capital expenditures in 1965 were \$120,395,000, compared with \$80,565,000 in 1964. Expenditures for engineering and research were \$63,788,000 compared with \$58,363,000.

Civilization Has Converts

LONDON (Reuters) — About 25 inhabitants of Tristan da Cunha, a lonely island in the South Atlantic, want to return to Britain, but cannot afford the fare for the 8,000-mile journey, it was learned here.

The group is part of the island's entire population of 280 brought to Britain in 1961 after a volcano erupted and wrecked their homes.

Homeliness persuaded them to return to rugged Tristan in 1963, but many of them yearn for the new way of life discovered in Britain and all the trappings of civilization.

Book Defending Former Minister May Sell Well

CHATHAM, Ont. (CP) — A book defending a former minister, jailed for contributing to juvenile delinquency here, may become a best-seller in this city.

And the former minister, Russell Horsburgh, 40, promises to be a critic of the book, *The Horsburgh Affair: Disciple or Deviate?*

Horsburgh, who resigned voluntarily from the ministry in June after sentence of a year in jail, is in Kent County jail awaiting word on leave to appeal his conviction to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Brisk sales were reported of the book, written by Rev. Ronald C. Smeaton of Sharbot Lake, Ont., and published in Toronto.

Horsburgh said he had read proofs of the book and as a result "I had to rewrite much of my own book." He has been working on the volume from Pulpit to Prison while in jail.

He told an interviewer he is working on two other books, one a collection of lectures given by distinguished speakers at his former church, the other a contemplative work called *Through The Bars*.

Horsburgh said if he is not cleared he intends to hire private detectives to investigate and tell the "real" story.

Mr. Smeaton, 30, served as Horsburgh's assistant for two years in Waterloo, Ont. His book criticizes the conduct of the Horsburgh trial and suggests Judge W. H. Fox based his judgment on the testimony of untrustworthy teen-age delinquents.
