

Canadiens Thump Rangers 5-3 For Big Series Lead

NEW YORK. (CP)—Montreal Canadiens moved within a game of the straight Stanley Cup final Sunday night as Bert Olmstead and Jean Beliveau scored two goals apiece to lead the National Hockey League champions to a 5-3 victory over New York Rangers.

The victory, their second in as many nights, gave the champions a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven semi-final, plus the advantage of home ice when the teams meet again Tuesday night.

Hit hard by Olmstead's pair of markers in the first period, the Rangers fought back to tie the score on goals by Wally Hergesheimer and Bill Gadsby.

But the powerful Canadiens moved ahead again as Beliveau and rookie Claude Provost scored two goals within 37 seconds in the second period. Beliveau's see-

ing tally in the third period put the game out of reach, although Andy Bathgate cut the margin with the final Ranger goal five minutes before the game ended.

A tripping penalty to Ranger rookie Andy Heberton early in the second period proved fatal to the New Yorkers.

DRAWN WORSLEY OUT
Goalie Lorne Worsley, drawn far out of his nets in blocking a

hard shot by Maurice Rocket Richard, left the goal wide open for Beliveau, who snared the rebound and made it 3-2 for the Canadiens.

Heberton had just returned to the ice when Provost's 25-foot drive produced the fourth Canadian goal after the youngster had intercepted a faulty Ranger pass.

A manpower advantage had produced the first Montreal tally as Guy Gendron went off for

slashing 35 seconds after the game began. Olmstead, a double scorer in Canadiens' 3-1 victory over the Rangers Saturday night, flicked in a drive by defenceman Doug Harvey from the right side of the net.
